Al resumen de lo dicho por otros sobre el texto la anotación rigurosa y la presentación de un texto limpio la acompaña en cada una de las ediciones de Senabre una innovadora lectura crítica del texto. El filólogo se alía con el crítico en la tarea de análisis. Otra lección permanente que se deriva de sus escritos que la literatura carece de límites genéricos o temporales. Don Ricardo ha escrito estudios importantes sobre la poesía del Renacimiento Fray Luis de León y Herrera y del Siglo de Oro. Quevedo. Góngora del pasado siglo XX. Juan Ramón Jiménez. Antonio Machado. Alberti. Blas de Otero entre muchos de narrativa desde el Lazarillo y el Quijote para luego pasar por los autores del realismo llegando a través de Camilo José Cela y Francisco Ayala hasta nuestras últimas voces lo mismo hizo con el teatro y con el ensayo. Una mención especial merece su libro Lengua y estilo de Ortega y Gasset 1964 sin duda uno de los estudios capitales publicado por un crítico académico en España. En su faceta como teórico de la literatura se ha ocupado de una serie de campos temáticos principalmente el de la lectura y el de la comunicación literaria en general. Junto a las importantes publicaciones de tipo didáctico tiene estudios monográficos. Mi libro preferido Metáfora y novela 2005 y lo adjetivó así porque admiro en esta mezcla de la voz profesoral que nos habla desde la página enunciando sustanciosos análisis críticos que lo han convertido en un clásico. Allí se puede aprender sobre la novela española actual o explorar el papel de lector o revisar la manera en que se incorpora la mujer a la temática narrativa. También presenta la riqueza del cine de la imagen fílmica que compite con la literaria. Subraya asimismo la importancia del entorno digital. Además nos enseña a interpretar la novela partiendo del contexto en que se inserta el texto. El posterior análisis detenido del mismo todo ello dirigido a que apreciemos la riqueza estética del mismo. Este volumen nace de unos seminarios ofrecidos en el Graduate Center de la Universidad de la ciudad de Nueva York y la Catedra Miguel Delibes. Al maestro no se le puede quitar su calidad de profesor ni reducir a éste a la de crítico. Aunque la ocasión exige brevedad no puedo pasar por alto la crítica semanal que sobre literatura primordialmente novela ha venido publicando en diversos suplementos literarios como ABC Cultural y El Cultural de El Mundo. Suman más de mil reseñas donde ha pasado revista a los grandes novelistas de nuestro tiempo. Nadie y lo repito nadie en el panorama español ha actuado con la independencia y la firmeza de criterio de Senabre. Autores famosos han sentido cómo la palabra crítica entraba en sus textos y mostraba el barro con que estaban hechos ciertos dolos comerciales. Otros en cambio quizás redactando sus textos en la modestia provinciana fueron ensalzados su tarea iluminada y clasificada entre las mejores. Como hiciera antes que él Leopoldo Alas Clarín ha sabido ser un vigía de la calidad literaria de nuestra novela actual exigiendo de los autores al menos dos cosas un buen estilo y una trama que revele algo de la sociedad. Si encontraba en su camino una novela donde la riqueza del texto provenía del encaje verbal también la supo apreciar. Terminó estas palabras diciendo algo sabido que su tarea ha sido reconocida con múltiples honores tanto la labor pedagógica como la de gestión principalmente en la Universidad de Extremadura su casa académica durante un tiempo.

Cuenta con reconocimientos tan importantes como la medalla de Oro de la Junta de Extremadura y la medalla de Honor de la Universidad Menéndez Pelayo UIMP de Santander que premi su labor de investigador y la de sabio de la literatura Su participaci n en numerosos premios literarios pienso en el Pr ncipe de Asturias de la Comunicaci n y Humanidades testimonia asimismo el reconocimiento social de su labor Escuch por ltima vez al maestro Senabre durante la inauguraci n del Instituto Cervantes de Utrecht Su lecci n vers sobre El Quijote Me di cuenta entonces de lo mucho que a oraba sus clases magistrales donde aprend de la historia de la lengua espa ola a trav s de los inmortales textos castellanos Todas las voces las de quienes participan en este homenaje concuerdan en el mismo juicio Ricardo Senabre es uno de nuestros fil logos m s exigentes que ha sabido adaptarse a las t cnicas y la reflexi n formal que exige la disciplina de la teor a literaria y a llevar semana tras semana su cr tica literaria al p blico lector Este homenaje resulta una forma de darle las gracias por su magisterio ejemplar

La Pantalla Popular José María Caparrós Lera,2005-01-01 Completo panorama cr tico del cine espa ol entre 1996 y 2003 abordado con ecuanimidad y sin lugares comunes en el que se estudia desde el cine de Almod var hasta el de Jos Luis Garcí pasando por ochenta de los filmes m s significativos del periodo y por el fen meno del Joven Cine Espa ol *Spain is (still) Different* Eugenia Afinoguénova,Jaume Martí-Olivella,2008-01-01 This volume constitutes the first interdisciplinary multi authored collection written in English on the topic of the cultural impact of tourism in Spain Its methodological range and scope make it accessible to experts in other areas and disciplines who as suggested in the book s introduction will find many of the ideas in the volume applicable to their own fields **Iberian Crime Fiction** Nancy Vosburg,2011-02-15 Iberian Crime Fiction is the first volume in English to provide an extensive overview of crime fiction in Spain and Portugal While the origins of peninsular crime fiction are traced in Nancy Vosburg s introductory chapter to the volume the essays focus on specific topics that provide readers with a sense of the development of the genre in the second half of the 20th century and current trends in the 21st century Patty Hart whose *The Spanish Sleuth* introduced English speaking readers to early crime fiction in Spain provides a summary account of the development of the crime novel from the 1950s through the 1980s highlighting the major authors and works that set the stage for the boom that followed the establishment of the novela negra tradition in the 1970s This tradition spearheaded by Manuel Vazquez Montalban is the subject of a separate essay by Maria Balibrea that analyzes the socio political conditions that gave rise to the novela negra NancyVosburg studies the emergence of a feminine feminist crime novel in the 1980s and 1990s and the subversion of masculine codes associated with crime fiction while Stewart King analyzes crime fiction from the Catalan Basque and Galician autonomous regions of Spain focusing on the political realities that resulted in a different use of the genre as a vehicle of regional nationalism David Knutson traces contemporary trends in Spanish crime fiction beginning in the 1990s and up to the present Paul Castro s essay documents the emergence of crime fiction in Portugal and the major works authors through to the present *Memories of the Maghreb* Adolfo Campoy-Cubillo,2012-10-22 Using a cultural studies approach this book explores how the Spanish colonization of

North Africa continues to haunt Spain's efforts to articulate a national identity that can accommodate both the country's diversity brought about by immigration from its old colonies and the postnational demands of its integration in the European Union

Zoom In, Zoom Out Sandra Barriaes-Bouche, Marjorie Attignol Salvodon, 2009-03-26

In the context of the transformations that Europe is undergoing *Zoom in Zoom out Crossing Borders in Contemporary European Cinema* attempts to serve as a testimony to the multiple ways in which European filmmakers are questioning the many borders of the continent. European films have become a vital cultural space where the relationship between borders and identity is being renegotiated. The films discussed here self-consciously address the question of European identity while overtly crossing geographic, cultural, linguistic and aesthetic borders. While all the articles explore the crossing of borders in Contemporary European films, the volume maintains diverse themes and perspectives as subtopics. It includes articles not only about films that deal thematically with border crossings but also articles that examine movies that cross borders in genres and techniques. The articles have different theoretical approaches: Film theory, Cultural Studies, History, Sociology, Philosophy and Psychoanalysis, and cover films from well-known cinematic traditions: French, Spanish, German and Italian as well as lesser-known cinematic traditions: Yugoslavian, Greek and Irish. As a whole, the essays frame the self-conscious gesture by European filmmakers to define European cinema as a work in progress or at the very least as a project that like Europe itself raises as many questions as it answers. This volume is a welcome addition to the growing critical literature on the evolution of the conception and practice of national cinema in Europe over the last two decades. Sandra Barriaes Bouche and Marjorie Attignol Salvodon have chosen a solid selection of representative case studies that reflects different critical approaches to the problem of maintaining local or national cinema production in Europe during a period of intense globalization. Their insightful introduction formulates the theme of unsettled borders and renegotiated identities that will resonate in the nine essays that follow. With a focus on the critical concept of these unsettled borders, the various authors explore the ways that the traditional mark of national space has been transformed through political and economic realignments as well as new technologies and the emergence of a new generation of filmmakers for whom national cinema no longer means what it did even twenty years ago. The volume provides a good balance of critical approaches that includes auteur studies, descriptions of state policies and the particular practices of filmmakers and producers in different parts of the continent: Spain, Germany, Ireland, the Balkans, and finally useful appendices that provide a close-up view of the complex nature of international co-productions. Marvin D Lugo, Professor of Spanish, Clark University. This is an interesting collection of essays that has been well conceived and organised. The standard of writing is high and I recommend publication. I particularly commend the conceptual framework underpinning the volume. This marries a cultural studies approach which still dominates the study of film in Area Studies and language departments across Europe and the US where filmic texts are increasingly used as teaching tools with the more industry-based focus one tends to find adopted by Media and Screen Studies departments. Thus this collection will appeal to a

wide range of students and academics The introduction sets out the volume's overarching framework cogently and clearly giving a nuanced exploration of the way that the notion of the border can be used as a dynamic prism to help define and explore the limits of our understanding of Europe European identity and European culture within which cinema has long played a key role The editors give a good account for example of the way film has been employed as a space to explore the possibilities of European integration by EU politicians as well as highlighting the flaws inherent within this project They do however perhaps suggest a certain Western European North American centric view in their suggestion that the cinema of Yugoslavia Greece or Ireland is somehow less well known than other national and transnational cinemas explored here Less well known to whom However from the broad range of cinemas explored in the rest of the volume clearly this is not the case Particular high points for me are the chapters on the work of Fatih Akin by Janis Little Solomon and John Davidson's discussion of Schulze gets the Blues as well as Olivier Asselin's fascinating account of Database Cinema This will be a good addition to scholarship on European film and I look forward to receiving my copy Professor Paul Cooke University of Leeds
