revolutionary spirit permeates contemporary culture as can be seen in the political actions of Pussy Riot in Russia the yellow vest protesters in France the BlackLivesMatter movement and the striking teachers and student protesters on campuses throughout the U S See inside the book May 68' - A Compendium Rene Vienet, Rene Riesel, Mustapha Khayati, 2018-05-07 As the 50th anniversary of the events of May 68 passes it leaves a familiar image heavy trail in it s wake young street fighting Parisians earnest but chic looking Sorbonne occupiers the iconic graffiti posters imagery all long since passed into the mythology of pop culture endlessly recycled and recuperated stripped bare of real political legacy Within that mythology the role of the Situationists has long been contested underplayed exaggerated misunderstood This compendium reprints crucial pieces written by the Situs themselves helping show May 68 as a reaction to a profound systemic stasis running deep through mid 20th C capitalism and to the autocratic hierarchical and tradition bound ruling class that still oversaw it in France On the Poverty of Student Life 1966 was originally printed via appropriated funds when 5 pro Situs were elected to Strasbourg Uni Student Union It's searing critique of what the authors considered the miserable passive consumerism of the modern hipster student was a powerful portent of what was to come The real poverty of his everyday life finds its immediate phantastic compensation in the opium of cultural commodities he is obliged to discover modern culture as an admiring spectator he thinks he is avant garde if he s seen the latest Godard or participated in the latest happening He discovers modernity as fast as the market can provide it Possibly the single most important document recording and analysing the events of May 68 remains Enrag s and Situationists in the Occupations Movement written by Rene Vienet a young pro Situ at the centre of the Sorbonne Occupation A 60 page chronological account at times it unselfconsciously captures the poetry of the revolution they were helping make but mostly the focus in on the objective material forces that shaped events after the initial occupation of the Sorbonne This vital piece is supplemented supported by contemporaneous Various Documents from May 68 and retrospective Further Reflections on May 68 from the Situationist International journal Slightly more tangentially Preliminaries on Councils and Councillist Organization looks deeper into the proto revolutionary structures that the Situationists saw at the very core of global post capitalism in the 20th century and beyond **Tactics** and Emancipation in the Age of Authoritarian Neoliberalism Nicholas Kiersey, William W. Sokoloff, 2023-04-11 This book calls for new attention to non traditional forms of emancipatory tactics and welcomes to the fold all manner of everyday expressions of anti authoritarianism Capitalism has taken the mask off Elites feel less obliged to pursue strategies of popular legitimization The traditional institutions of representative democracies are thus hollowing out and stand before us corrupted and broken In this milieu the prospects for a democratic entering of the state are seen as increasingly fantastical and the Left is advised instead to adopt a more tactical posture These expressions can run the gamut from the more obviously theatrical antics of The Yes Men to those of black bloc and other direct action militant groups already well known from their interventions in the cities of Berkeley and Charlottesville This volume addresses this problem via the concept of tactics The

The Walls Have the Floor Julien Besancon, 2018-05-11 The graffiti of the French student and worker uprising of May 1968 capturing participatory politics in action Graffiti itself became a form of freedom Julien Besan on The Walls Have the Floor Fifty years ago in 1968 barricades were erected in the streets of Paris for the first time since the Paris Commune of nearly one hundred years before The events of May 1968 began with student protests against the Vietnam War and American imperialism expanded to rebellion over student living conditions and resistance to capitalist consumerism An uprising at the Sorbonne was followed by wildcat strikes across France uniting students and workers and bringing the country s economy to a halt There have been many accounts of these events This book tells the story in a different way through the graffiti inscribed by protestors as they protested The graffiti collected here is by turns poetic punning hopeful sarcastic and crude It quotes poets as often as it does political thinkers Many wrote I have nothing to write signaling not their naivet but their desire to participate Other anonymous declarations included Prohibiting prohibited The dream is reality The walls have ears Your ears have walls Exaggeration is the beginning of invention Comrades you re nitpicking You don t beg for the right to live you take it and I came I saw I believed A meeting is called at the Grand Amphitheater of the Sorbonne Agenda the worldwide revolution This was interactive participatory politics before Twitter and Facebook Although the revolution of May 1968 didn t topple the government Charles de Gaulle fled the country only to return in June his party won a resounding electoral mandate it made history In The Walls Have the Floor Julien Besan on collected traces of this history before the walls
