Unsettled Multiculturalisms Barnor Hesse, 2000-11 This anthology reconsiders the social political and intellectual meanings of multiculturalism in the West particularly Britain It introduces a conceptual language for thinking about multiculturalism and casts the surrounding debates in the contexts of globalization post colonialism and what Barnor Hesse calls multicultural transruptions The contributors consider a variety of diaspora formations ranging from the Muslim Umma and Black Britain to the Chinese foodscape and Transatlantic Black sporting performances They examine the transnational impact on how cultural differences are lived and pose questions for how we participate in and think about Western societies The material on cultural entanglements focuses on media constructions of the Asian Gang in Britain gender and sexuality in ragga music and the ambivalence of identities in post apartheid South Africa

Immigrant Lives Edward Shizha, Edward Makwarimba, 2023 Voluntary and involuntary human mobility in the form of migration is a natural human phenomenon which has been a central feature from the ancient times into the modern times While the boundaries between voluntary and involuntary migrants are blurred voluntary migrants in the context of this book refer to those who migrate out of their own free choice based on socioeconomic considerations while involuntary migrants are forced to leave their country out of fear of persecution or insecurity caused by political violence or civil and military strife In this book the terms newcomer foreign born and migrant and immigrant are used interchangeably and refer to those who were born in another country and later emigrated to another country as permanent residents later becoming citizens asylum seekers and refugees Migration is an increasing challenge faced by countries institutions and individuals in both sending and receiving countries In countries where there is a large inflow of immigrants migration has created a multiple origin transnationally connected socio economically differentiated and legally stratified demographic landscape which lends itself to a description of superdiverse societies Jensen Vertovec 2007 Most industrialized countries mostly in the Global North are experiencing low birth rates and are dependent on immigrants to satisfy their job market and population growth while less developed nations mostly in the Global South are experiencing low economic growth inadequate socioeconomic opportunities These social and economic challenges are presently the cornerstone of migration transnationalism and transnationality

Empire Windrush, 1948 (b/w photo). , In 1948 the Empire Windrush was en route from Australia to England via the Atlantic docking in Kingston Jamaica An advert had appeared in a Jamaican newspaper offering cheap transport on the ship for anybody who wanted to come and work in the UK At that time there were no immigration restrictions for citizens of one part of the British Empire moving to another part The Empire Windrush arrived at Tilbury on 22 June 1948 carrying 492 passengers from Jamaica wishing to start a new life in the United Kingdom The passengers including one stowaway were the first large group of West Indian immigrants to the UK after the Second World War

Liminal Spaces: Migration and Women of the Guyanese Diaspora Grace Aneiza Ali, 2020-09-29 *Liminal Spaces* is an intimate exploration into the migration narratives of fifteen women of Guyanese heritage It spans diverse intergenerational perspectives from those who leave Guyana and those who are left and seven seminal decades of Guyana's history from the 1950s to the present day bringing the voices of women to the fore The volume is conceived of as a visual

extensive archival research shows however that the racism of ministers and senior functionaries led rather than followed public opinion In the late 1940s the Labour government faced a birthrate perceived to be in decline massive economic dislocations caused by the war a huge national debt severe labor shortages and the prospective loss of international preeminence Simultaneously it subsidized the emigration of Britons to Australia Canada and other parts of the Empire recruited Irish citizens and European refugees to work in Britain and used regulatory changes to dissuade British subjects of color from coming to the United Kingdom Paul contends post war concepts of citizenship were based on a contradiction between the formal definition of who had the right to enter Britain and the informal notion of who was or could become really British Whitewashing Britain extends this analysis to contemporary issues such as the fierce engagement in the Falklands War and the curtailment of citizenship options for residents of Hong Kong Paul finds the politics of citizenship in contemporary Britain still haunted by a mixture of imperial economic and demographic imperatives **LGBTQ+ Healthy**
