Early modern France and Austria as baroque states

Early modern France was not an "absolute" monarchy. Many historians have rejected the concept of "absolutism" and have replaced it with other terms which are more accurate. Peter R. Campbell writes that France under Louis XIV did not become a modern, centralized, bureaucratic state; instead, from the late sixteenth century to the revolution, France was what Campbell calls a "baroque state," characterized by "honor, familial advancement, corporatism, patronage, and clientage." Louis XIV and his successors "had to respect all the rights, privileges and customs of the corporations, orders and localities." France was not a centralized, bureaucratic state, but "a diverse collection of provinces and corporate bodies dominated by independently minded local clites." The bureaucracy was not modern, but operated with such traditional elements as patronage, clientage, and venality. I believe that the description of "baroque" applies not only to France, but to many other early modern European states. One which I have been studying was Austria and the Habsburg lands. Like France, the Habsburg empire was composed of many territories which possessed their own traditions, customs, and institutions. This paper is an examination of France and the Habsburg monarchy in the early modern period, primarily the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and their respective systems of government, to explain why both were baroque states.

France:

Among the institutions with which the monarchy had to cooperate were the provincial estates. By the eighteenth century, there were four grand pays d'états: Brittany, Burgundy, Provence and Languedoc. The primary function of the estates was to vote taxes for the royal government, and they also played an important role in the administration of their provinces. The provincial estates, as Dominique Le Page and Jérôme Loiseau write, continued to exercise their traditional functions of giving consent to and the administration of taxation, and they had taken on new ones, most importantly the borrowing of money on behalf of the royal government. In the late seventeenth century, the estates, trying to avoid higher direct taxes, had "acquired a significant financial credit." The finance ministry "used the credit of the estates to pledge loans on behalf of the king. Indeed, the financial credit of the estates refers, in the last analysis, to their administrative capacities which are in the hands of permanent executive commissions whose members are chosen by assembly, in agreement with the king," The royal government turned to the provincial estates for loans because it "needed other sources of funding that would rely on stable, well-managed

The study draws on new ways of approaching literary history through the history of the book and of reading The Essais are treated as a mobile transnational work that travelled from Bordeaux to Paris and beyond to markets in other countries from England and Switzerland to Italy and the Low Countries Close analysis of editions paratexts translations and annotated copies is informed by a distinct concept of the social context of a text The concept is derived from anthropologist Alfred Gell's notion of the art nexus the specific types of actions and agency relations mediated by works of art understood as indexes that give rise to inferences of particular kinds Throughout the two volumes the focus is on the particular nexus in which a copy an edition an extract is embedded and on the way that nexus might be described by early modern people The Intervention of Philology Jane O.
