

speaker wants to present to his hearer the death as organized in detail that it fits the picture as an event which arouses pity. That "pity" is not different depending on what death one knows about, exists as an independent emotion, rather than varying with each case, depending upon each experience of it.

This theory of expression is incompatible with the idea of social personality as expressive. If the show itself of what I've seen, experienced, without any filtering or shaping or falsifying of my own mind to fit it to a standard, if this were expressive, then "pity" itself can hardly be expressive in the same way to you as your own pity, derived from different experience. In the representative situation, when I tell you about my particular feelings as they appear, there is no expressive work to be done, "just living." No shaping or falsifying of the scene makes it more expressive, but the very, because, once shaped to fit into a general pattern the expression would seem less "authentic." Equally, the principle of expression of emotion is social, for in not having the same report of pity, you and people do not have a common sense of pity to share as a social emotion.

By contrast, under a system of expression as the presentation of emotion, the man in public has an identity as an actor—as *you* see him—and this identity involves him and others in a social expression as a presentation of emotion is the actor's job. If in a moment we take that word in a very broad sense, his identity is as making expression as presentation work. When a culture shifts from a presentation of emotion to representation of it, individual experiences reported accurately come to seem apart from the public man's function, and so an identity is lost. As the meaningful identity, expression itself becomes less and less real.

I apologize for compressing this theory so, but it will be helpful to the reader to know how much underlies the idea of public man as actor. Indeed, a sense of these logical connections is necessary to understand the very peculiar terms in which man as actor was spoken of to people who inhabited the public world of the ancient regime capital. There were three major voices.

The first was the most common voice to be heard among the spokesmen of the time: if we inhabit a *theatrum mundi*, and become like actors, then a new, happier morality is upon us. The second was the more probing one of writers like Diderot, who explored the relation to public life and its relation to nature. The third was the singular voice of Rousseau. Rousseau's was the greatest theory of the time about the bridge between cosmopolitan life and chaotic life, the strong condemnation of it. Analyst and critic, he was also prophet, preferring that the public order would succumb to a life more authentic, intimate feeling and political repression combined.

one condition—no much like our present-day condition—he approved. Yet he was also a bad prophet, for he believed that the new order would come through the fall of the city and the resurgence of the small town. His ideas are a touchstone to exploring how the public world has come to be lost in modern urban culture, a culture replacing the expressive life and identity of the public man with a new life, more personal, more authentic, and, all things considered, emptier.

THE COMMON-SENSE VIEW OF MAN AS ACTOR

By the opening of Book Seven of *Pam Jones*, the young man's adventures have become centered in London. It is at this point that Fielding presents a little essay called "A Comparison Between the World and the Stage." He begins as follows:

The world hath been often compared to the theatre . . . this thought hath been carried so far, and become so general, that some words proper to the theatre, and which were, at first, metaphorically applied to the world, are now indiscriminately and literally spoken of both: thus stage and scene are by common use grown as familiar to us, when we speak of life in general, as when we confine ourselves to dramatic performances. . . .

Fielding is apologetic in tone a little later on, of course his readers know that the stage and the streets are really that "literally" translate into each other; he is talking in cliché and he excuses himself. He just wants to remind his dear readers that the mixture of dramatic and ordinary life is real, is no fancy "metaphor" as it was in the Restoration.²⁴

"The world as a stage" was indeed an old cliché dressed up in new ways by the mid-eighteenth century. We have observed that one of the classic functions of the *theatrum mundi* imagery was to detach human nature from social action, by separating actor from art. In the common-sense view of man as actor, personally you were no longer indelible as a bad man for committing a bad act; you just needed to change your behavior. Man as actor bears a lighter moral yoke than either Puritan or devout Catholic: he is not born into sin, he enters into it if he happens to play an evil part.

Fielding himself put it well. In his essay he argued that "a single bad act no more constitutes a villain in life than a single bad part on the stage," and that indeed, as the realism of city and theatre have become intertwined, the analogy becomes a literal truth. The character of acts and the character of actors are separate, so that a man of the world "can
