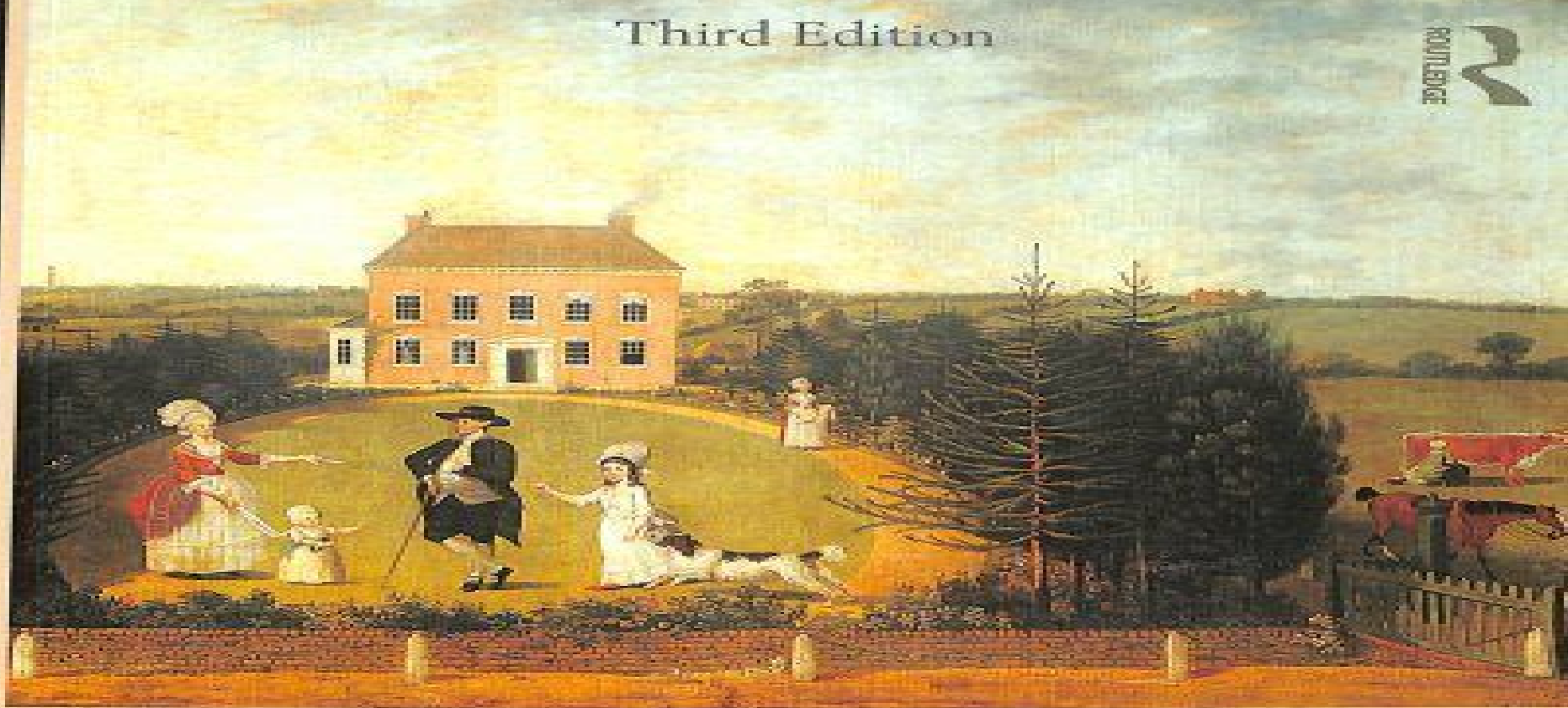
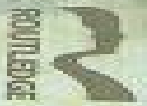

American Apostles Christine Leigh Heyrman, 2015-09-01 The surprising tale of the first American Protestant missionaries to proselytize in the Muslim world In *American Apostles* the Bancroft Prize winning historian Christine Leigh Heyrman brilliantly chronicles the first fateful collision between American missionaries and the diverse religious cultures of the Levant Pliny Fisk Levi Parsons Jonas King though virtually unknown today these three young New Englanders commanded attention across the United States two hundred years ago Poor boys steeped in the biblical prophecies of evangelical Protestantism they became the founding members of the Palestine mission and ventured to Ottoman Turkey Egypt and Syria where they sought to expose the falsity of Muhammad's creed and to restore these bastions of Islam to true Christianity Not only among the first Americans to travel throughout the Middle East the Palestine missionaries also played a crucial role in shaping their compatriots understanding of the Muslim world As Heyrman shows the missionaries thrilled their American readers with tales of crossing the Sinai on camel sailing a canal boat up the Nile and exploring the ancient city of Jerusalem But their private journals and letters often tell a story far removed from the tales they spun for home consumption revealing that their missions did not go according to plan Instead of converting the Middle East the members of the Palestine mission themselves experienced unforeseen spiritual challenges as they debated with Muslims Jews and Eastern Christians and pursued an elusive Bostonian convert to Islam As events confounded their expectations some of the missionaries developed a cosmopolitan curiosity about even an appreciation of Islam But others devised images of Muslims for their American audiences that would both fuel the first wave of Islamophobia in the United States and forge the future character of evangelical Protestantism itself *American Apostles* brings to life evangelicals first encounters with the Middle East and uncovers their complicated legacy The Palestine mission held the promise of acquainting Americans with a fuller

Jews and Other Germans Till van Rahden, 2008 Examines the integration of Jews into German society between 1860 1925 taking as an example the city of Breslau then Germany now Wrocław Poland Questions whether there was a continuous line from the German treatment of Jews before World War I to Nazi antisemitism During and after World War I relations between Jews and non Jews worsened and the high level of Jewish integration eroded between 1916 25 Although the constitution of the Weimar Republic accorded Jews equality they experienced acts of violence and discrimination Argues that antisemitism became stronger as the economic situation of the Jews deteriorated due to inflation and the emigration to Germany of 4 273 impoverished Jews from Poland and Russia between 1919 23 Concludes nevertheless that no direct line can be drawn between the antisemitism in Imperial Germany and that of the Nazi period

The Culture of Sensibility G. J. Barker-Benfield, 1992 During the eighteenth century sensibility which once denoted merely the receptivity of the senses came to mean a particular kind of acute and well developed consciousness invested with spiritual and moral values and largely identified with women How this change occurred and what it meant for society is the subject of G J Barker Benfield s argument in favor of a culture of sensibility in addition to the more familiar cult Barker Benfield s expansive account traces the development of sensibility as a defining concept in literature religion politics economics education domestic life and the social world He demonstrates that the cult of sensibility was at the heart of the culture of middle class women that emerged in eighteenth century Britain The essence of this culture Barker Benfield reveals was its articulation of women s consciousness in a world being transformed by the rise of consumerism that preceded the industrial revolution The new commercial capitalism while fostering the development of sensibility in men helped many women to assert their own wishes for more power in the home and for pleasure in the world beyond Barker Benfield documents the emergence of the culture of sensibility from struggles over self definition within individuals and above all between men and women as increasingly self conscious groups He discusses many writers from Rochester through Hannah More but pays particular attention to Mary Wollstonecraft as the century s most articulate analyst of the feminized culture of sensibility Barker Benfield s book shows how the cultivation of sensibility while laying foundations for humanitarian reforms generally had as its primary concern the improvement of men s treatment of women In the eighteenth century identification of women with virtue in distress the author finds the roots of feminism to the extent that it has expressed women s common sense of their victimization by men Drawing on literature philosophical psychology social and economic thought and a richly developed cultural background *The Culture of Sensibility* offers an innovative and compelling way to understand the transformation of British culture in the eighteenth century

Breaking Conventions Patricia Auspos, 2023-07-13 This rich history illuminates the lives and partnerships of five married couples: two British, three American, whose unions defied the conventions of their time and anticipated social changes that were to come in the ensuing century.
