Fokkelman, 2023-08-14 Analysis of text structures has been a dominant feature in Biblical studies for quite some time More recently scholars have focused on rhetorical strategies that have been employed in Biblical texts In this volume rhetorical as well as structural approaches to the Hebrew Bible have been brought together It contains studies on a range of topics and on a good many texts and textual corpuses Interpretation culminates in translation The contributors to this volume have discussed the implications of their findings for Bible translators Many of these translational implications have been put together in an epilogue The volume thus not only intends to show the present state of our knowledge of literary and rhetorical techniques employed in the Bible on these points it aims to be a selective guide to translators as well The volume has been edited by Lenart de Regt Jan de Waard both of the Free University of Amsterdam and Jan Fokkelman Leiden University A Syntactic Description of Biblical Hebrew Poetry Rachel Anne-Lyne Krohn, 2021 This study applies generative linguistics to the study of Biblical Hebrew BH poetry The traditional approach to BH poetry assumes that BH poems are arranged in a series of semantically parallel couplets Biblical scholars have long viewed this approach to BH poetry as deficient but have continued to work within this framework in the absence of a clear and compelling alternative In *Hebrew Verse Structure* 1980 reprint Winona Lake Eisenbrauns 1997 Michael P O Connor advocated a new approach to BH poetry that he called the Syntactic Description The Syntactic Description was based on principles of generative grammar because O Connor argued that the conventions of BH poetry were primarily syntactic rather than semantic In this study I argue that the fundamentals of O Connor s approach were sound but his approach needs to be updated and revised before it will become a viable alternative to the prevailing parallelistic approach To that end I put forward the Revised and Extended Hebrew Verse Structure Model for reading BH poetry an approach that updates and extends O Connor s model for analyzing biblical poetry I then analyze two poems 2 Sam 1 19 27 and Lamentations 1 to demonstrate the viability of the Revised and Extended Hebrew Verse Structure Model and to advocate a movement away from the traditional approach to BH poetry **The Basics of Hebrew Poetry** Samuel T. S. Goh, 2017-10-12 Almost 75 percent of the Old Testament is made up of poetic passages yet for many readers lay Christians even seminary students and pastors biblical poetic passages remain the greatest challenge Being unfamiliar with poetry in general and biblical poetry in particular their reading and preaching are limited to selected poetic passages This in turn limits their understanding of God s

word To help readers overcome these problems the first four chapters of this book aim to get them familiarized with the literary techniques of biblical poets To demonstrate how the techniques work to bring across the biblical theological message the last three chapters offer poetic analyses of three passages of different kinds In the process we hope to draw attention to the beauty of the Hebrew poetic art and to the creative skill of biblical poets versification The ultimate aim however is to help readers discover the rich message of the Bible

*The Form and Function of the Tricolon in the Psalms of Ascents* Simon P. Stocks, 2012-06-01 This book explores the little regarded phenomenon of the tricolon in biblical Hebrew poetry that is those poetic lines that appear to have a tripartite form rather than the more common bipartite form Taking the Psalms of Ascents as a sample corpus of poetic texts it identifies tricola on an explicit and consistent basis It draws on the rhythmical accentual approach of Eduard Sievers and in so doing highlights an important but neglected aspect of his method The concept of a para tricolon is developed designating a line that is tripartite yet rhythmically equivalent to a conventional bicolon Analyses of psalm structures and of the syntactic and semantic structures of each tripartite line facilitate an assessment of the function of and characterization of tripartite lines The significance of enjambment is explored as a distinguishing factor between different line forms and as a means of uniting non parallel cola The study demonstrates clear differences between the form and function of para tricola and those of tricola and so will facilitate a more nuanced and realistic appraisal of the functional significance of Hebrew poetic line forms

Tiberian Hebrew Phonology Joseph L. Malone, 1993 This impressive study analyzes the form of biblical Hebrew that was canonized by the Masoretes Jewish religious and language scholars who were centered in Tiberias in the late first millennium C E The grammatical system of the Masoretes is the key to understanding the Hebrew Bible and yet because of its tremendous complexity the system has often been neglected This study of Tiberian Hebrew phonology is a valuable contribution toward a fuller understanding of Masoretic grammar The sound system of biblical Hebrew is quite distinct from that of modern Hebrew and is the most elaborate of all the attested Semitic languages Dr Malone s thorough analysis describes this sound system in light of both recent linguistic study generative phonology and his own far ranging work on other Semitic languages The results of his work are stated in the form of phonological rules that will assist the biblical Hebrew scholar in understanding phonology and its impact on Hebrew grammar The reader will find much value in the elaborate charts and diagrams throughout the book especially chapter 10 which illustrates the derivations of the first twenty verses of the Book of Genesis and chapter 12 which presents an inventory of Tiberian Hebrew words and phrases of particular interest A glossary and bibliography complete the book
