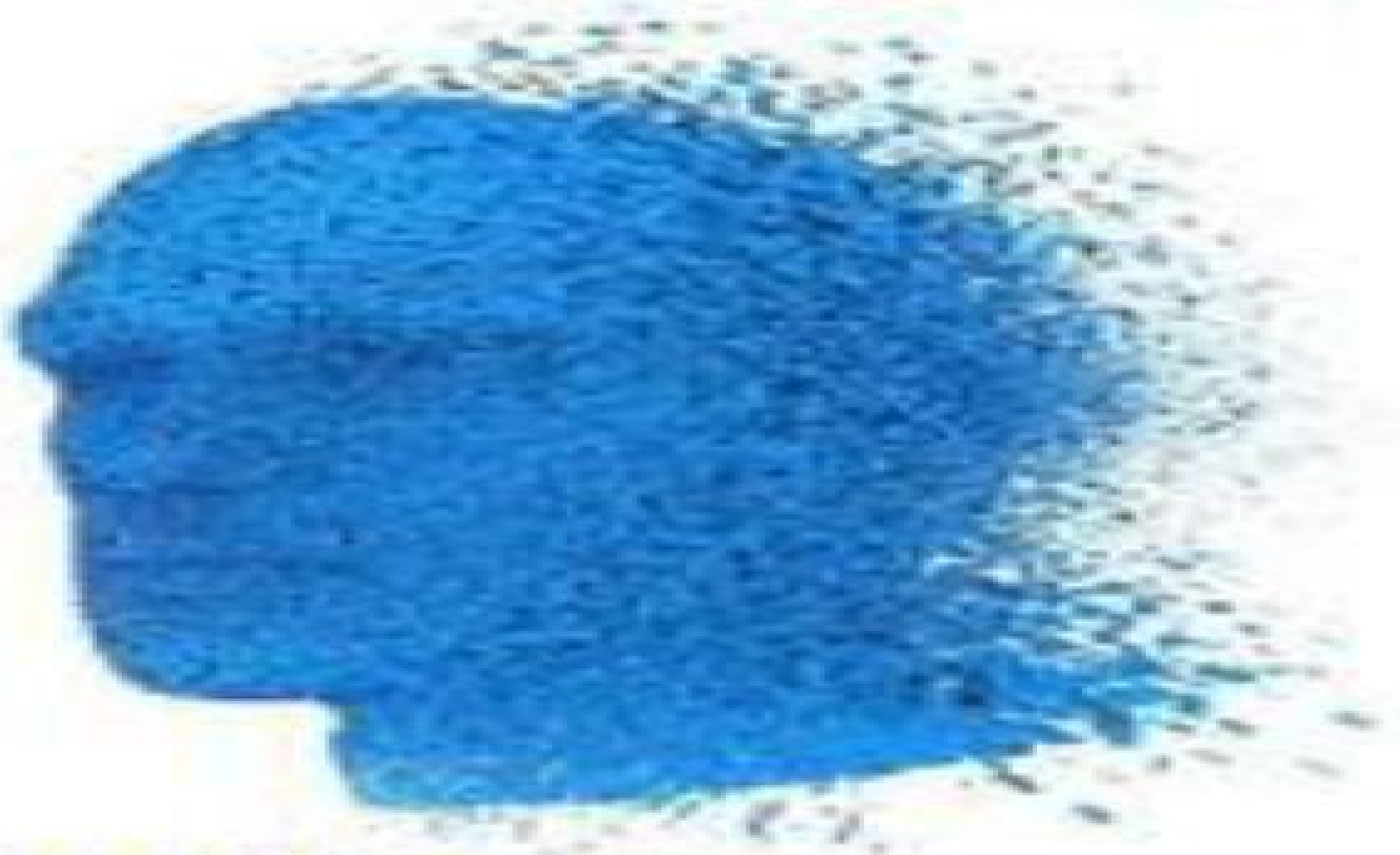

The Memoirs of Toussaint and Isaac Louverture Arthur F. Saint-Aubin, 2015-07-15 This book examines the memoir of Toussaint Louverture a former slave general in the French army and leader of the Haitian Revolution and the memoir of his son Isaac The Revolution and its leaders have been studied and written about extensively Until recently 2004 however the memoir of Toussaint has received little attention and only as a historical document This is the first study that explores the 1802 work foremost as a literary text a creative production that deploys the techniques of fiction and drama to make truth claims about the past moreover this is the first book length study of Isaac Louverture s memoir The two texts are read as examples of how black men thought of themselves as men citizens and therefore how they expressed their masculinity at that historical moment as experiences of mourning and loss This study builds upon three areas of scholarship the tradition of memoir writing historicist readings of Toussaint s memoir and descriptions and theories of men and masculinity within the black Atlantic The study distinguishes itself in ways that will make it of interest to more than just historians in addition to using the intersection of race and masculinity as an analytical tool it speaks to the nature of literary creativity and it draws from studies examining the relationship between history memory and fiction As a result scholars and students in literary and cultural criticism as well as those in gender and diasporic studies will also find this study of interest and value *Thinking through the Mothers* Janet Beizer, 2011-03-15 If questions of subjectivity and identification are at stake in all biographical writing they are particularly trenchant for contemporary women biographers of women Often their efforts to exhume buried lives in hope of finding spiritual foremothers awaken maternal phantoms that must be embraced or confronted Do women writing in fact have any greater access to their own mothers lives than to the lives of other women whose stories have been swept away like dust in the debris of the past In *Thinking through the Mothers* Janet Beizer surveys modern women s

biographies and contemplates alternatives to an approach based in lineage and the form of thought that emphasizes the line the path hierarchy unity resemblance reflection and the aesthetic mimesis that depends on these ideas Through close readings of memoirs and fictions about mothers Beizer explores how biographers of the women who came before rehearse and rewrite relationships to their own mothers biographically as they seek to appropriate the past in a hybrid genre she calls bio autobiography Thinking through the Mothers features the work of George Sand and Colette and spans such varied figures as Gustave Flaubert Julian Barnes Louise Colet Eunice Lipton Vladimir Nabokov Huguette Bouchardeau and Christa Wolf Beizer seeks an alternative to women's salvation biography or resurrection biography that might resist nostalgia be attentive to silence and reinvent the means to represent the lives of precursors without appropriating traditional models of genealogy

cha ju, 1923 *American Fragments* Daniel Diez Couch, 2022-05-03 In the years between the independence of the colonies from Britain and the start of the Jacksonian age American readers consumed an enormous number of literary texts called fragments American Fragments recovers this archive of the romantic period to raise a set of pressing questions about the relationship between aesthetic and national realities What kind of artistic creation was a fragment And how and why did deliberately unfinished writing emerge alongside a country that was itself still unfinished Through discussions of eighteenth century transatlantic aesthetics the Revolutionary War seduction novels religious culture and the construction of authorship Daniel Diez Couch argues that the literary fragment was used as a means of representing individuals who did not fit neatly

into the social fabric of the nation beggars prostitutes veterans and other ostracized figures These individuals did not have a secure place in designs for the country's future yet writers wielded the artistic form of the fragment as an apparatus for surveying their disputed positionality Time and again fragments asked what kind of identity marginalized individuals had and how fictionalized versions of their life stories influenced the sociopolitical circumstances of the emergent nation In their most progressive moments the writers of fragments depicted their subjects as being in process opting for a fluid version of the self instead of the bounded and coherent one typically hailed as the liberal individual Traversing aesthetics political philosophy material culture and history *American Fragments* gives new life to a literary form that at once played a significant role in the print ecology of the early republic and that endures in the works of modernist and postmodernist writers and artists
