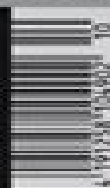


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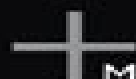
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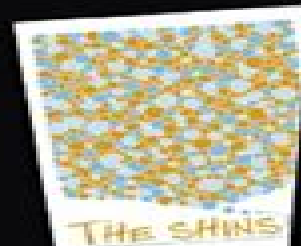

Gordon Parks Visions 199:

Troubling Vision Nicole R. Fleetwood, 2011-01-15 *Troubling Vision* addresses American culture's fixation on black visibility exploring how blackness is persistently seen as a problem in public culture and even in black scholarship that challenges racist discourse Through trenchant analysis Nicole R Fleetwood reorients the problem of black visibility by turning attention to what it means to see blackness and to the performative codes that reinforce resignify and disrupt its meaning Working across visual theory and performance studies Fleetwood asks How is the black body visualized as both familiar and disruptive How might we investigate the black body as a troubling presence to the scopical regimes that define it as such How is value assessed based on visible blackness Fleetwood documents multiple forms of engagement with the visual even as she meticulously underscores how the terms of engagement change in various performative contexts Examining a range of practices from the documentary photography of Charles Teenie Harris to the excess flesh performances of black female artists and pop stars to the media art of Fatimah Tuggar to the iconicity of Michael Jackson Fleetwood reveals and reconfigures the mechanics codes and metaphors of blackness in visual culture *Troubling Vision* is a path breaking book that examines the problem of seeing blackness the simultaneous hyper visibility and invisibility of African Americans in US visual culture in the last half century Weaving together critical modes and methodologies from performance studies art history critical race studies visual culture analysis and gender theory Fleetwood expands Du Bois's idea of double vision into a broad questioning of whether representation itself will resolve the problem of the black body in the field of vision With skilled attention to historical contexts documentary practices and media forms she takes up the works of a broad variety of cultural producers from photographers and playwrights to musicians and visual artists and examines black spectatorship as well as black spectacle In chapters on the trope of non iconicity in the photographs of Charles Teenie Harris the visible seams in the digital images of the artist Fatimah Tuggar and a coda on the un dead Michael Jackson Fleetwood's close analyses soar *Troubling Vision* is a beautifully written original and important addition to the field of American Studies Announcement of the American Studies Association for the 2012 Lora Romero First Book Publication Prize

Russell Lee a contemporary of Walker Evans and Dorothea Lange now emerges from the shadows as one of the most influential documentary photographers in American history The most prolific photographer of the Great Depression Russell Lee has never been canonized for his iconic images With this compulsively readable and definitive biography historian and archivist Mary Jane Appel finally uncovers Lee s rebellious life tracing his journey from blue blood beginnings to intrepid years of activism and pioneering creativity through the incredible body of work he left behind Born in the quintessential turn of the century small town of Ottawa Illinois in 1903 Lee grew up in a wealthy family riddled with tragedy He trained in college to become a chemical engineer but was quickly drawn to Greenwich Village where he developed an interest in social change and the arts In 1935 the charismatic bohemian picked up a camera and a year later walked into the office of Roy Stryker head of the Historical Section of the Resettlement Administration later renamed the Farm Security Administration FSA setting in motion a new life trajectory The Historical Section aimed to capture rural poverty and the New Deal programs designed to abolish it But Stryker imagined a much broader pictorial sourcebook for America and no one on his legendary team including Dorothea Lange Walker Evans and Gordon Parks among others would be more dedicated to reaching this goal than Russell Lee As Appel demonstrates Stryker and Lee developed a fascinating symbiotic relationship that resulted in a massive and complex breadth of work Living out of his car from the fall of 1936 to mid 1942 Lee crisscrossed America s back roads more than any photographer of his era During this time he shot 19 000 negatives that were captioned and printed more than twice that of any other FSA photographer He captured arresting images of sweeping dust storms and devastating floods and chronicled the World War II home front and the last gasp of a small town America that was inexorably vanishing all the while focusing prophetically on issues like segregation and climate change decades before they became national concerns Meticulously weaving previously unseen letters and diaries Appel brilliantly reveals why Lee s profile has remained obscured while his contemporaries became broadly celebrated With more than 100 images spread throughout Russell Lee

speaks not only to the complexity of a pioneering documentary photographer's work but to a seminal American moment captured viscerally like never before **Wisdom for the Soul** Larry Chang, 2006 Five Millennia of Prescriptions for Spiritual Healing Parkscapes Thomas R. H.
