The Empirical Stance Bas C. van Fraassen, 2008-10-01 What is empiricism and what could it be Bas C van Fraassen one of the world's foremost contributors to philosophical logic and the philosophy of science here undertakes a fresh consideration of these questions and offers a program for renewal of the empiricist tradition.
