DEFINITION

This concept underpins the scientific method and has been applied across disciplines, including science, psychology, and economics.

EXAMPLES

- **Controlled experiments:** In controlled experiments, variables are manipulated within a lab environment to determine cause and effect relationships.
- **Observational studies:** In observational studies, researchers observe and record behaviors or phenomena to test their hypotheses.
