Weerman, 1999-11-30 Most linguistic theories assume that each grammatical relation is established in a unique structural configuration Neeleman and Weerman take issue with this view arguing for a more flexible approach on the basis of conceptual considerations and data taken mostly but not exclusively from the Germanic languages In depth analyses of word order phenomena as well as diachronic and typological generalizations motivate a re evaluation of the role of case in the projection of arguments Case is shown to provide a syntactic foothold for thematic interpretation something which is necessary in a grammar that does not allow fixed theta positions Thus this study does not only offer a genuine alternative to many standard assumptions it also explains why there should be such a thing as case in natural language

Understanding Interfaces Laura Domínguez, 2013-06-27 By combining theoretical analysis and empirical investigation this monograph investigates the status of interfaces in Minimalist linguistic theory second language acquisition and native language attrition Two major questions are currently under debate 1 what exactly makes a linguistic phenomenon an interface phenomenon and 2 what is the specific role that the interfaces play in explaining language loss and persistent problems in second language acquisition Answers to these questions are provided by a theoretical examination of the role that economy and computational efficiency play in recent Minimalist models of the language faculty as well as by evidence obtained in two empirical studies examining the acquisition and attrition of two interface phenomena Spanish subject realization and word order variation The result is a new definition of interface phenomena which deemphasizes syntactic complexity and focuses on the effect of interface interpretive conditions on syntactic structure This work also shows that representational deficits cannot be ruled out in the acquisition and attrition of interface structures

**Dynamical Grammar** Peter W. Culicover, Andrzej Nowak, 2003

Dynamical Grammar explores the consequences for language acquisition language evolution and linguistic theory of taking the underlying architecture of the language faculty to be that of a dynamical system The authors investigate whether it is possible for a complex adaptive system to identify the categories structures and rules of a language given access only to instances of grammatical utterances of that language The linguistic tradition says that this is impossible but there is a growing body of literature in psychology and computer science arguing that grammar can be uncovered using purely statistical techniques applied to the distribution of forms in a string of words The book goes on to discuss whether a learner requires information about structure that goes beyond the information that is contained in the meaning Does the learner have to have knowledge of grammar per se prior to language acquisition as has been traditionally assumed The authors ask whether it is possible to adequately describe and explain linguistic phenomena if we restrict ourselves to the relatively impoverished apparatus that we require for language acquisition They explore the consequences of adopting a radical form of minimalism to try to reconcile the linguistic facts with the book's perspective of language acquisition Culicover and Nowak investigate to what extent it is possible to account for language variation in dynamical terms as a consequence of the behaviour of the complex social network in which languages and the properties of languages are acquired by learners through interactions with other speakers over time

#### Semantic Role Universals and Argument Linking Ina

Friederici, 2009-09-24 The concept of semantic roles has been central to linguistic theory for many decades More specifically the assumption of such representations as mediators in the correspondence between a linguistic form and its associated meaning has helped to address a number of critical issues related to grammatical phenomena Furthermore in addition to featuring in all major theories of grammar semantic or thematic roles have been referred to extensively within a wide range of other linguistic subdisciplines including language typology and psycho neurolinguistics This volume brings together insights from these different perspectives and thereby for the first time seeks to build upon the obvious potential for cross fertilisation between hitherto autonomous approaches to a common theme To this end a view on semantic roles is adopted that goes beyond the mere assumption of generalised roles but also focuses on their hierarchical organisation The book is thus centred around the interdisciplinary examination of how these hierarchical dependencies subserve argument linking both in terms of linguistic theory and with respect to real time language processing and how they interact with other information types in this process Furthermore the contributions examine the interaction between the role hierarchy and the conceptual content of generalised semantic roles and investigate their cross linguistic applicability and psychological reality as well as their explanatory potential in accounting for phenomena in the domain of language disorders In bridging the gap between different disciplines the book provides a valuable overview of current thought on semantic roles and argument linking and may further serve as a point of departure for future interdisciplinary research in this area As such it will be of interest to scientists and advanced students in all
