He reveals that Augustine's understanding of the goods constitutive of social and political life is deeply indebted to the Stoic and Peripatetic doctrine of *oikeiosis* or social appropriation. The colorful personal and practical details found in these writings provide a window onto Augustine's moral reasoning not available in his more theoretical treatments of the good, and the concrete cases often illustrate the human significance of properly discerning the good. Beyond providing one of the first analyses of these ethical writings, this work contributes a new sense of Augustine's ethics both in terms of the range of questions he addresses and the manner in which he treats them.

*The Good Life* Charles Siegel, 2016-09-11 The main tradition of classical philosophy had a clear idea of the good life based on human flourishing Modern philosophers rejected this tradition because they believed in the logical principle that we cannot derive ought statements from is statements which makes it impossible to base ethics on human nature This book shows that this logical principle is false You can derive ought statements from teleological is statements statements about function goal or purpose Philosophers rejected classical ethics not because of a logical problem but because they rejected Aristotle's teleological view of nature In the seventeenth century philosophers accepted the new physics which explained nature on the basis of mechanical causes not of goals If nature is not teleological then it is impossible to base ethics on human nature But we still think teleologically about human nature when we base our idea of health on the proper functioning of our basic physical capabilities Likewise by basing the idea of arete on the proper functioning of all our capabilities we can develop a version of classical ethics that is still convincing after the modern age

demonstrates that rather than seek to establish politics on the definitive metaphysical ground Alfarabi s Plato analyzes politics on its own terms phenomenologically      *A Theory of Virtue* Robert Merrihew Adams,2008-10-23 The distinguished philosopher Robert M Adams presents a major work on virtue which is once again a central topic in ethical thought *A Theory of Virtue* is a systematic comprehensive framework for thinking about the moral evaluation of character Many recent attempts to stake out a place in moral philosophy for this concern define virtue in terms of its benefits for the virtuous person or for human society more generally In Part One of this book Adams presents and defends a conception of virtue as intrinsic excellence of character worth prizing for its own sake and not only for its benefits In the other two parts he addresses two challenges to the ancient idea of excellence of character One challenge arises from the importance of altruism in modern ethical thought and the question of what altruism has to do with intrinsic excellence Part Two argues that altruistic benevolence does indeed have a crucial place in excellence of character but that moral virtue should also be expected to involve excellence in being for other goods besides the well being and the rights of other persons It explores relations among cultural goods personal relationships one s own good and the good of others as objects of excellent motives The other challenge the subject of Part Three of the book is typified by doubts about the reality of moral virtue arising from experiments and conclusions in social psychology Adams explores in detail the prospects for an empirically realistic conception of excellence of character as an object of moral aspiration endeavor and education He argues that such a conception will involve renunciation of the ancient thesis of the unity or mutual implication of all virtues and acknowledgment of sufficient moral luck in the development of any individual s character to make virtue very largely a gift rather than an individual achievement though nonetheless excellent and admirable for that      *The Challenges of Capitalism for Virtue Ethics and the Common Good* Kleio Akrivou,Alejo José G.
