It was to the solution of such difficulties that R. E. The Use of Hereford William Smith, 2017-05-15 The Use of Hereford a local variation of the Roman rite was one of the diocesan liturgies of medieval England before their abolition and replacement by the Book of Common Prayer in 1549 Unlike the widespread Use of Sarum the Use of Hereford was confined principally to its diocese which helped to maintain its individuality until the Reformation This study seeks to catalogue and evaluate all the known surviving sources of the Use of Hereford with particular reference to the missals and gradual which so far have received little attention In addition to these a variety of other material has been examined including a number of little known or unknown important fragments of early Hereford service books dismembered at the Reformation and now hidden away as binding or other scrap in libraries and record offices This is the fullest examination of Hereford liturgical sources ever undertaken and may stimulate similar and much needed studies of other diocesan uses in particular Sarum and York As well as describing in detail the various manuscript sources the rare single edition printed Hereford texts the missals and breviaries are also discussed Unlike books of the Sarum and York rites these one offs were never revised and reissued In addition to the examination of these sources William Smith discusses the possible origins of the rite and provides an analysis of the Hereford liturgical calendar of the festa including those of the cathedral s patron St Ethelbert and the no less famous St Thomas Cantilupe that helped to make Hereford use so distinctive

Christian Solar Symbolism and Jesus the Sun of Justice Kevin Duffy, 2022-02-24 This pioneering study of Christian sun symbolism describes how biblical light motifs were taken up with energy in the early Church Kevin Duffy argues that living in a world of 24 7 illumination we need to reconnect with the sun and its light to appreciate the meaning of light in the Bible and Christian tradition With such a retrieval we can appreciate Pope Francis s insistence that like the moon the Church does not shine with its own light and assess the claim that the Eucharist is to be celebrated Ad Orientem that is towards the rising sun in the East Liturgy architecture poetry and the writings of saints and theologians such as Augustine Hildegard of Bingen Francis of Assisi and Thomas Traherne offer abundant resources for a much needed ressourcement While Christ was preached as the True Sun among sun worshipping Aztecs and the consecrated host was placed in a solar monstrance on Baroque altars in the modern era solar themes have been neglected In this accessible work the author suggests that we rebalance a spiritual symbolism that has over emphasised darkness and cloud at the expense of light and sun He proposes a creative retrieval of the traditional title of Christ as the Sun of Justice This title blends the personal the social and the cosmic ecological and speaks powerfully to a secularising era that contemporaries Friedrich Nietzsche and Th r se of Lisieux both described as one where the sun does not shine

Understanding the Medieval Meditative Ascent Robert McMahon, 2006 The Confessions Proslogion and Consolation of philosophy like the Divine comedy all enact Platonist accents These accents generate implied meditative meanings which scholars have explored only in part Each work calls us to read forward on its journey to understanding and to meditate

backwards on the stages of the ascent and the relations between them Augustine Anselm Boethius and Dante wrote for readers experienced in meditating on the Bible adept at exploring relations between far distant passages They designed these works as spiritual exercises for the same kind of reading and meditations This book uses literary analysis to discover new philosophical meaning in these works Book jacket

Messiaen the Theologian Andrew Shenton, 2010 For Olivier Messiaen music was a way of expressing his faith He considered it his good fortune to have been born a Catholic and declared that the illumination of the theological truths of the Catholic faith is the first aspect of my work the noblest and no doubt the most useful Messiaen is one of the most widely performed and recorded composers of the twentieth century and his popularity is increasing but the theological component of his music has so far been neglected and continues to provide a serious impediment for some of his audience Messiaen the Theologian makes a significant contribution by providing cultural and historical context to Messiaen's theology An array of international Messiaen scholars cover a wide variety of topics including Messiaen's personal spirituality the context of Catholicism in France in the twentieth century and comparisons of Messiaen with other artists such as Dante and Maritain

Textual Situations Andrew Taylor, 2015-08-31 Generations of scholars have meditated upon the literary devices and cultural meanings of The Song of Roland But according to Andrew Taylor not enough attention has been given to the physical context of the manuscript itself The original copy of The Song of Roland is actually bound with a Latin translation of the Timaeus Textual Situations looks at this bound volume along with two other similarly bound medieval volumes to explore the manuscripts and marginalia that have been cast into shadow by the fame of adjacent texts some of the most read medieval works In addition to the bound volume that contains The Song of Roland Taylor examines the volume that binds the well known poem Sumer is icumen in with the Lais of Marie de France and a volume containing the legal Decretals of Gregory IX with marginal illustrations of wayfaring life decorating its borders Approaching the manuscript as artifact Textual Situations suggests that medieval texts must be examined in terms of their material support that is literal interpretation must take into consideration the physical manuscript itself in addition to the social conventions that surround its compilation Taylor reconstructs the circumstances of the creation of these medieval bound volumes the settings in which they were read inscribed and shared and the social and intellectual conventions surrounding them

Lost Artefacts from Medieval England and France Katherine Baker, 2022 Contemporary descriptions of objects no longer extant examined to reconstruct these lost treasures Surviving accounts of the material culture of medieval Europe including buildings boats reliquaries wall paintings textiles ivory mirror cases book bindings and much more present a tantalising glimpse of medieval life hinting at the material richness of that era However students and scholars of the period will be all too familiar with the frustration of trying to piece together a picture of the past from a handful of fragments The material turn has put art architecture and other artefacts at the forefront of historical and cultural studies and the resulting spotlight on the material culture of the past has been illuminating for researchers in many fields Nevertheless the loss of so

much of the physical remnants of the Middle Ages continues to thwart our understanding of the period and much of the knowledge we often take for granted is based on a series of arbitrary survivals. The twelve essays in this book draw on a wide array of sources and disciplines to explore how textual records from the chronicles of John of Worcester and Matthew Paris and inventories of monastic treasures and noble women to Beowulf and early English riddles when combined with archaeological and art historical evidence can expand our awareness of artistic and cultural environments. Touching on a broad range of issues around how we imaginatively reconstruct the medieval past and a variety of objects both precious and ephemeral, this volume will be of fundamental interest to medieval scholars whatever their disciplinary field.

English Birth Girdles, Mary Morse, 2024-05-06. In medieval England, women in labor wrapped birth girdles around their abdomens to protect themselves and their unborn children. These parchment or paper rolls replicated the girdle relics of the Virgin Mary and other saints loaned to queens and noblewomen, extending childbirth protection to women of all classes. This book examines the texts and images of nine English birth girdles produced between the reigns of Richard II and Henry VIII. Cultural artifacts of lay devotion within the birthing chamber, the birth girdles offered the solace and promise of faith to the parturient woman and her attendants amid religious dissent, political upheaval, recurring epidemics, and the onset of print.

Jeffrey Chipps Smith, 1983. *Imagining the Self, Imagining the Other*, Eva Frojmovic, 2021-10-05. This collection revisits the complex subject of medieval visual representations of Jews and Judaism by themselves and by Christians. The topics range from questions of Jewish identity in Iberian illuminated Hebrew manuscripts, 13th-14th centuries, to representations of Synagoga and Judas in the Bible Moralisée and cathedral sculpture to early modern Jewish self-images. The essays are prefaced by a critical study of the discovery of medieval Jewish art among art historians and cultural activists ca. 1900-35. The volume will be of value to art historians as well as medieval and early modern historians with an interest in Jewish culture and Jewish-Christian relations.
