Economies of Change Michal Peled Ginsburg,1996 The analysis of each novel centers around the notion of transformation or the economy of change as it informs the text and our understanding of it arguing that transformation is not only a basic category of narrative structure but also the key to the link between literary form and cultural context Throughout the book addresses topical issues in current literary theory and cultural studies such as the cultural significance of narrative and its historical dimension in a distinctly practical manner showing how in a number of determinate cases narrative actually works

Inheritance and Speculation in Victorian Fiction Noa Reich,2024-06-30 *Inheritance and Speculation in Victorian Fiction* Finance Family and the Law investigates how Victorian fiction reconfigures the narrative and social conventions of inheritance While recent criticism has concentrated on this fiction s engagement with newer financial forms this book contends that Victorian novels both attest to the persistence of inheritance and reveal its unsettling affinities with speculative forms Focusing on Emily Bront s *Wuthering Heights* 1847 Charles Dickens s *Our Mutual Friend* 1864 65 Wilkie Collins s *Armadale* 1866 and George Eliot s *Middlemarch* 1871 72 each chapter explores a recurring pattern of contrast and conflation between inheritance and financial speculation Taking an interdisciplinary historical and formal approach Reich shows how this pattern gives narrative shape to concerns that were also emerging in contemporary political and legal debates around succession bequest landed estates and conceptions of the family Attending to the novels concrete and figurative allusions to these forms as well as their tentative alternatives Reich also illustrates how the novels self reflexive subversion of both characters and readers expectations based on inheritance conventions challenge our modes of reading *Inheritance and Speculation* thus not only illuminates the integral role played by inheritance in Victorian fiction s mediation of the credit economy but also offers a new understanding of the complex role of convention in this fiction The Dickens Industry Laurence W. Dickens was not always a favorite among critics Celebrated for his novels advocating social reform for half a century after his death he was ridiculed by those academics who condescended to write about him Only the faithful band of devotees who called themselves Dickensians kept alive an interest in his work Then during the Second World War he was resurrected by critics and was soon being hailed as the foremost writer of his age a literary genius alongside Shakespeare and Milton More recently Dickens has again been taken to task by a new breed of literary theorists who fault his chauvinism and imperialist attitudes Whether he has been adored or despised however one thing is certain no other Victorian novelist has generated more critical commentary This book traces Dickens's reputation from the earliest reviews through the work of early 21st century commentators showing how judgments of Dickens changed with new standards for evaluating fiction Mazzeno balances attention to prominent critics from the late 19th century through the first three quarters of the 20th with an emphasis on the past three decades during which literary theory has opened up new ways of reading Dickens What becomes clear is that in attempting to provide fresh insight into Dickens's writings critics often reveal as much about the predilections of their own age as they do about the novelist Laurence W Mazzeno is President Emeritus of Alvernia University Reading Pennsylvania *The Oxford Handbook of Charles Dickens* Robert L. traditional concepts of medium and message that continue to inform studies of print culture and the mass media especially in the wake of industrialized production in the early nineteenth century It breaks new ground in the exploration of the difference between mass culture and literature and will appeal to cultural historians and literary critics alike **Novel Science** Adelene Buckland, 2022-12-22 Novel Science is the first in depth study of the shocking groundbreaking and sometimes beautiful writings of the gentlemen of the heroic age of geology and of the contribution these men made to the literary culture of their day For these men literature was an essential part of the practice of science itself as important to their efforts as mapmaking fieldwork and observation The reading and writing of imaginative literatures helped them to discover imagine debate and give shape and meaning to millions of years of previously undiscovered earth history Borrowing from the historical fictions of Walter Scott and the poetry of Lord Byron they invented geology as a science discovered many of the creatures we now call the dinosaurs and were the first to unravel and map the sequence and structure of stratified rock As Adelene Buckland shows they did this by rejecting the grand narratives of older theories of the earth or of biblical cosmogony theirs would be a humble science faithfully recording minute details and leaving the big picture for future generations to paint Buckland also reveals how these scientists just as they had drawn inspiration from their literary predecessors gave Victorian realist novelists such as George Eliot Charles Kingsley and Charles Dickens a powerful language with which to create dark and disturbing ruptures in the too seductive sweep of story Misfit Forms Lorri G.
