early life and career the history of New Zealand and its film industry the history of local comedy and its undervaluation in favor of more serious art and ethnicity in New Zealand comedy Bannister then focuses on Waititi's films beginning with *Eagle vs Shark* 2007 and its place in New Geek Cinema despite being an outsider even in this realm Bannister uses *Boy* 2010 to address the comedian comedy arguing that Waititi is a comedic entertainer before being a director With *What We Do in The Shadows* 2014 Bannister explores Waititi's use of the vampire as the archetypal immigrant struggling to fit into mainstream society under the guise of a mockumentary Waititi's *Hunt for the Wilderpeople* 2016 Bannister argues is a family friendly rural based romp that plays on and ironizes aspects of Aotearoa New Zealand identity *Thor Ragnarok* 2017 launched Waititi into the Hollywood realm while introducing a Polynesian perspective on Western superhero ideology Finally Bannister addresses *Jojo Rabbit* 2019 as an anti hate satire and questions its quality versus its topicality and timeliness in Hollywood By viewing Waititi's career and filmography as a series of pranks Bannister identifies Waititi's playful balance between dominant art worlds and emergent postcolonial innovations New Zealand national identity and indigenous Aotearoan and Jewish roots and masculinity and androgyny *Eye of the Taika* is intended for film scholars and film lovers alike
