academic regard for them and the book reflects on the presence and marketing of words in a variety of adaptations from the introduction of sound in the late 1920s to the mid 1930s This book contextualizes a range of adaptations in relation to debates about picturizations of books in the early sound era including reactions to the talking adaptation by writers such as Irwin Panofsky Aldous Huxley and Graham Greene Film adaptations of Shakespeare Dickens gothic fiction and biopics are also discussed in relation to their use and promotion of sound or more precisely words
