Malik, 1999-06-03 A growing interest in political Islam also called Islamism has assumed significant ideological and intellectual dimensions especially in recent years Rather than viewing it as Islam versus the rest or tradition against modernity this volume without overlooking the tensions also acknowledges the mutualities It centres on issues such as the Rushdie affair conflictive pluralism in South Asia and its linkages with the crucial regional themes like the Kashmir dispute Iranian revolution civil war in Afghanistan and Western public diplomacy Freemasonry and the Press in the Twentieth Century Paul Calderwood, 2016-04-15 By the end of the twentieth century Freemasonry had acquired an unsavoury reputation as a secretive network of wealthy men looking out for each others interests The popular view is of an organisation that if not actually corrupt is certainly viewed with deep mistrust by the press and wider society Yet as this book makes clear this view contrasts sharply with the situation at the beginning of the century when the public's perception of Freemasonry in Britain was much more benevolent with numerous establishment figures including monarchs government ministers archbishops and civic worthies enthusiastically recommending Freemasonry as the key to model citizenship Focusing particularly on the role of the press this book investigates the transformation of the image of Freemasonry in Britain from respectability to suspicion It describes how the media projected a positive message of the

organisation for almost forty years based on a mass of news emanating from the organisation itself before a change in public regard occurred during the later twentieth century This change in the public mood the book argues was due primarily to Masonic withdrawal from the public sphere and a disengagement with the press Through an examination of the subject of Freemasonry and the British press a number of related social trends are addressed including the decline of deference the erosion of privacy greater competition in the media the emergence of more aggressive and investigative journalism the consequences of media isolation and the rise of professional Public Relations The book also illuminates the organisation's collisions with nationalism communism and state welfare provision As such the study is illuminating not only for students of Freemasonry but those with an interest in the wider social history of modern Britain The King is Dead, Long Live the King! **Healing in Hell** Ken Adams,2011-12-13 Ken Adams as a trained medic was sent out to the Far East and immediately saw action on the Malay Peninsula Captured at Singapore he initially worked at Changi Hospital Many moves and much worse capos in Thailand were to follow He describes his life work and the terrible conditions endured at the hands of the Japanese and Korea guards and worst of all the Kempetai secret police Illnesses such as dysentery malaria avitaminosis cholera and smallpox had to be treated with minimal or no medicines Starvation was a fact of life The author was frequently moved around and in 1945 took part in a march of many hundreds of miles which inevitably proved fatal to many of his fellow POWs Liberation and repatriation are movingly described as most significantly is the whole process of settling back into normal life after so long in captivity of the worst kind Healing in Hell is an exceptional account that demands reading

*Hutch* Charlotte Breese,2012-01-16 The vivid true story of one of the biggest stars in Britain during the 1920s and 30s and the inspiration for Downton Abbey s Jack Ross Born in Grenada in 1900 Leslie Hutch Hutchinson went to America in 1916 to study medicine but soon escaped to Harlem where he witnessed the birth of stride jazz piano and began playing and singing in bars himself Moving to France in 1923 he became the protege and lover of Cole Porter before coming to London where he was soon topping the bills in variety and on radio Immaculate in white tie and tails Hutch had enormous sex appeal his velvet voice and superb piano improvisation attracting legions of fans including the then Prince of Wales and most famously Edwina Mountbatten Despite his success Hutch was a profoundly insecure man with insatiable appetites for sex drink gambling and social status which precipitated his fall from fame to a squalid existence by the late 1960s
