Peter Handke Plays: 1 Peter Handke, 1997 **The Ride Across Lake Constance and Other Plays** Peter Handke, 1976 A collection of six plays by Nobel Prize winner Peter Handke spanning the early years of the Austrian playwright's career The first full length play The Ride Across Lake Constance is one of Handke's best known works It deals directly with one of Handke's favorite themes the realities of theater itself independent of the offstage world and the way language dialogue and objects props operate in the skewed world of the stage Therein it anticipates They Are Dying Out the second full length play in this volume In some ways more conventional than many of Handke's plays They Are Dying Out presents one of his most fascinating protagonists Quitt a businessman who first induces a group of colleagues to set up a monopoly and then torpedoes the scheme The four short plays that round out the book Prophecy Calling for Help Quodlibet and My Foot My Tutor were written before The Ride Across Lake Constance and show Handke moving from the experimental mode of his early work toward the richness and complexity that have marked him as the most important dramatist since Beckett Publisher description **Kaspar and Other Plays** Peter Handke, 1970-01-01 Nobel Prize winner Peter Handke's first full length drama hailed in Europe as the play of the decade and compared in importance to Waiting for Godot Kaspar is the story of an autistic adolescent who finds himself at a complete existential loss on the stage with but a single sentence to call his own Drilled by prompters who use terrifyingly funny logical and alogical language sequences Kaspar learns to speak normally and eventually becomes creative doing his own thing with words for this he is destroyed In Offending the Audience and Self Accusation one character speaks Handke further explores the relationship between public performance and personal identity forcing us to reconsider our sense of who we are and what we know **Outside-In □ Inside-Out** Costantino Maeder, Olga Fischer, William J. Herlofsky, 2005-02-28 This fourth volume of the Iconicity series is like its predecessors devoted to the study of iconicity in language and literature in all its forms Many of the papers turn the notion of iconicity inside out some suggesting that less is more others focus on the cognitive factors inside the brain that are important for the iconic phenomena that are produced in the outside world In addition this volume includes a paper related to iconicity in music and its interaction with language Other papers range from the theoretical issues involved in the evolution of language to those that offer many inside out claims such as claiming that nouns are derived from pronouns and as such should more properly be called pro pronouns Also this volume includes perhaps the first English language analysis of the iconic aspects of sound symbolism in a prayer from the Koran This is a truly interdisciplinary collection that should turn some of the notions of iconicity in language and literature outside in and inside out **Plays : 1** Peter Handke, 1997 This collection from Austria's best known playwright includes Offending the Audience My Foot My Tutor Self Accusation Kaspar The Ride Across Lake Constance and They Are Dying Out *Theater after Film* Martin Harries, 2025-05-23 A study of the impact of film and mass culture on drama after World War II In Theater after Film Martin Harries argues that after 1945 as

cinema became omnipresent in popular culture theater had to respond to cinema's hegemony Theater couldn't break that hegemony but it could provide a zone of contestation Theater made film's domination of the cultural field visible through hyperbole refusal and other strategies thereby unsettling its power Postwar theatrical experiment Harries shows often channeled and represented film's mass cultural force while knowing that it could never possess that force Throughout the book Harries brings critical theory into contact with theories of performance Although Theater after Film treats the theatrical work of many figures its central focus falls on Tennessee Williams Samuel Beckett and Adrienne Kennedy Discussions of these dramatists consider their ways of addressing spectators the politics of race between film and theater and the place of the theatrical apparatus Readings of these central figures in twentieth century theater exemplify the book's historical engagement with the media surround that drama confronted This confrontation Harries shows was central to the development of some of the most continually compelling postwar drama

Rethinking Character in Contemporary British Theatre Cristina Delgado-García, 2015-11-13 The category of theatrical character has been swiftly dismissed in the academic reception of no longer dramatic texts and performances However claims on the dissolution of character narrowly demarcate what a subject is and how it may appear This volume unmoors theatre scholarship from the regulatory ideals of liberal humanism stretching the notion of character to encompass and illuminate otherwise unaccounted for subjects aesthetic strategies and political gestures in recent theatre works To this aim contemporary philosophical theories of subjectivation European theatre studies and experimental script led work produced in Britain since the late 1990s are mobilised as discussants on the question of subjectivity Four contemporary playtexts and their performances are examined in depth Sarah Kane's *Crave* and *4 48 Psychosis* Ed Thomas's *Stone City Blue* and Tim Crouch's *ENGLAND* Through these case studies Delgado García demonstrates alternative ways of engaging theoretically with character and elucidating a range of subjective figures beyond identity and individuality Alongside these analyses the book traces a large body of work that has experimented with speech attribution since the early twentieth
