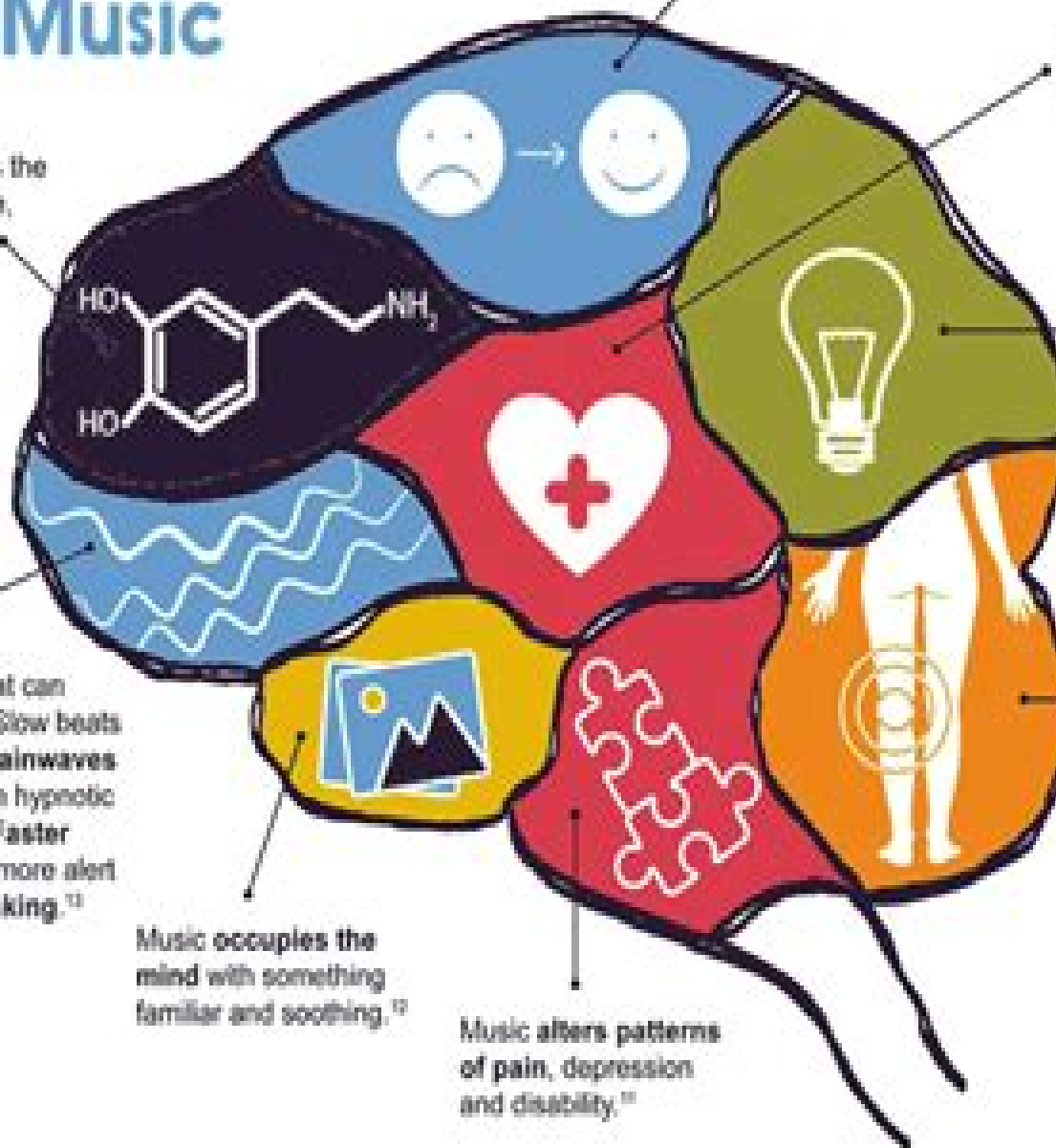


# Your Brain On Music
