Egyptian Wall Paintings Marsha Hill, 2012 *Egyptian Wall Paintings* Charles Kyrle Wilkinson, Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York, N.Y.), 1983 Publications of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, 1964-2005 Metropolitan Museum of Art, 2012-10-09 The present volume Publications of The Metropolitan Museum of Art 1964 2005 is a successor to a volume published by the Museum in 1965 entitled Publications of The Metropolitan Museum of Art 1870 1964 These two bibliographic volumes endeavor to list all the known books pamphlets and serial publications bearing the Museum s imprint and issued by the institution during the first 135 years of its existence through June 2005 The first volume was compiled by Albert TenEyck Gardner at the time an Associate Curator of American Paintings and Sculpture and the present volume has been compiled from the Annual Reports issued by the Museum during the relevant years Together the two volumes testify to the tremendous contributions made to knowledge by the curators and conservators of the Metropolitan and by the many other experts who have contributed to the Museum s exhibition catalogues Various issues of the Bulletin emphasize the great sweep of the Museum s acquisitions during these years and the exhibition catalogues a number of them Alfred H Barr Jr Award or the George Wittenborn Award testify to the continuity of the institution s dedicated program to enrich people s lives through knowledge of art This title was originally published in 2006 *Ezekiel's Sign-Acts* Tyler D. Mayfield, Penelope Barter, 2024-11-04 The Ezekiel passages describing the instructions for and dramatization of divine messages Ezekiel 3 5 12 24 37 are among the most bizarre in the Hebrew Bible The prophet is commanded to embody his message of judgment to Jerusalem and these actions clarify the oracles they surround Yet these sign acts are frequently overlooked within Ezekiel studies which tend to focus on the book s strange visions and controversial oracles This volume addresses the growing diversity in approaches in Ezekiel studies by inviting international senior and junior scholars to focus on the texts concerning Ezekiel s sign acts It aims to redirect scholarly attention to these often ignored texts which stand so central to understanding the nature of prophecy as well as the overall book of Ezekiel *The Image of God in the Garden of Eden* Catherine L. McDowell, 2015-09-09 Catherine McDowell presents a detailed and insightful analysis of the creation of adam in Gen 2 5 3 24 in light of the Mesopotamian m s p p t p washing of the mouth opening of the mouth and the Egyptian wpt r opening of the mouth rituals for the creation of a divine image Parallels between the mouth washing and opening rituals and the Eden story suggest that the biblical author was comparing and contrasting human creation with the ritual creation animation and installation of a cult statue in order to redefine elem eloh m as a human being the living likeness of God tending and serving in the sacred garden McDowell also considers the explicit image and likeness language in Gen 1 26 27 Drawing from biblical and extrabiblical texts she demonstrates that elem and dem t define the divine human relationship first and foremost in terms of kinship To be created in the image and likeness of Elohim was to be metaphorically speaking God s royal sons and daughters While these royal qualities are explicit in Gen 1 McDowell persuasively argues that kinship is the primary

metaphor Gen 1 uses to define humanity and its relationship to God Further she discusses critical issues noting the problems inherent in the traditional views on the dating and authorship of Gen 1 3 and the relationship between the two creation accounts Through a careful study of the text in Genesis she demonstrates that Gen 2 4 serves as both a hinge and a telescope the creation of humanity in Gen 2 5 3 24 should be understood as a detailed account of the events of Day 6 in Gen 1 When Gen 1 3 are read together as the final redactor intended these texts redefine the divine human relationship using three significant and theologically laden categories kinship kingship and cult Thus they provide an important lens through which to view the relationship between God and humanity as presented in the rest of the Bible

Statuary from Royal Buildings at Amarna Marsha Hill, Kristin Thompson, 2024-04-15 Over more than a century and a quarter of excavations the royal and administrative buildings in the city of Amarna have yielded the remains of many hundreds of statues that had been part of Akhenaten s visionary plan But fragmentation and dispersal have up until now made the results almost invisible Only a relatively small number of the original statues have been widely known even to experts The present publication brings together all these traces of the city s past to reveal the abundance beauty variety and novelty of the statuary and to begin the process of reintegrating it in considerations of the temples and palaces of the city The work is presented in two parts The first volume presents extensive observations about the creation of the statuary comprising chapters dealing with the range of materials and the methods of working them a detailed explication of the novel

creation of composite statuary and an overview of the workshop buildings that have been identified so far at Amarna In the second volume the excavated fragments themselves most of them previously unpublished are catalogued in a series of chapters devoted to individual royal buildings The original statues are envisioned and analysed for their contexts resulting in new information about these buildings the intentions and concerns behind them and the evolution in those intentions

The Birds of Ancient Egypt Patrick F. Houlihan, 2023-09-30 Hailed as a sumptuously produced and finely illustrated outstanding contribution to ancient Egyptian studies this facsimile reprint of Patrick Houlihan's 1986 comprehensive study makes a welcome return in the Oxbow Classics in Egyptology series Animals of all kinds are amply illustrated in Egyptian art none more so than birds in both secular and religious contexts and in hieroglyphic scripts A great variety of bird species has for millennia made twice yearly migrations passing over Egypt which is also an important overwintering area for many These migrant birds together with indigenous species were an abundant and easily exploited source of food for ancient Egyptians for domestication and status display Tomb scenes displaying birds provided as food for the deceased are abundant as are procession scenes of offering with bearers bringing gifts of fowl Many birds also had religious associations Houlihan provides a systematic and unparalleled survey of all the bird life depicted by the ancient Egyptians in art and hieroglyphic writing some 72 species plus bats with a list of known mummified species and discussions on their religious and secular associations and many illustrations Their present day distributions are compared with that known from the time of the Pharaohs A checklist of the birds of modern Egypt is provided by Steven Goodman
