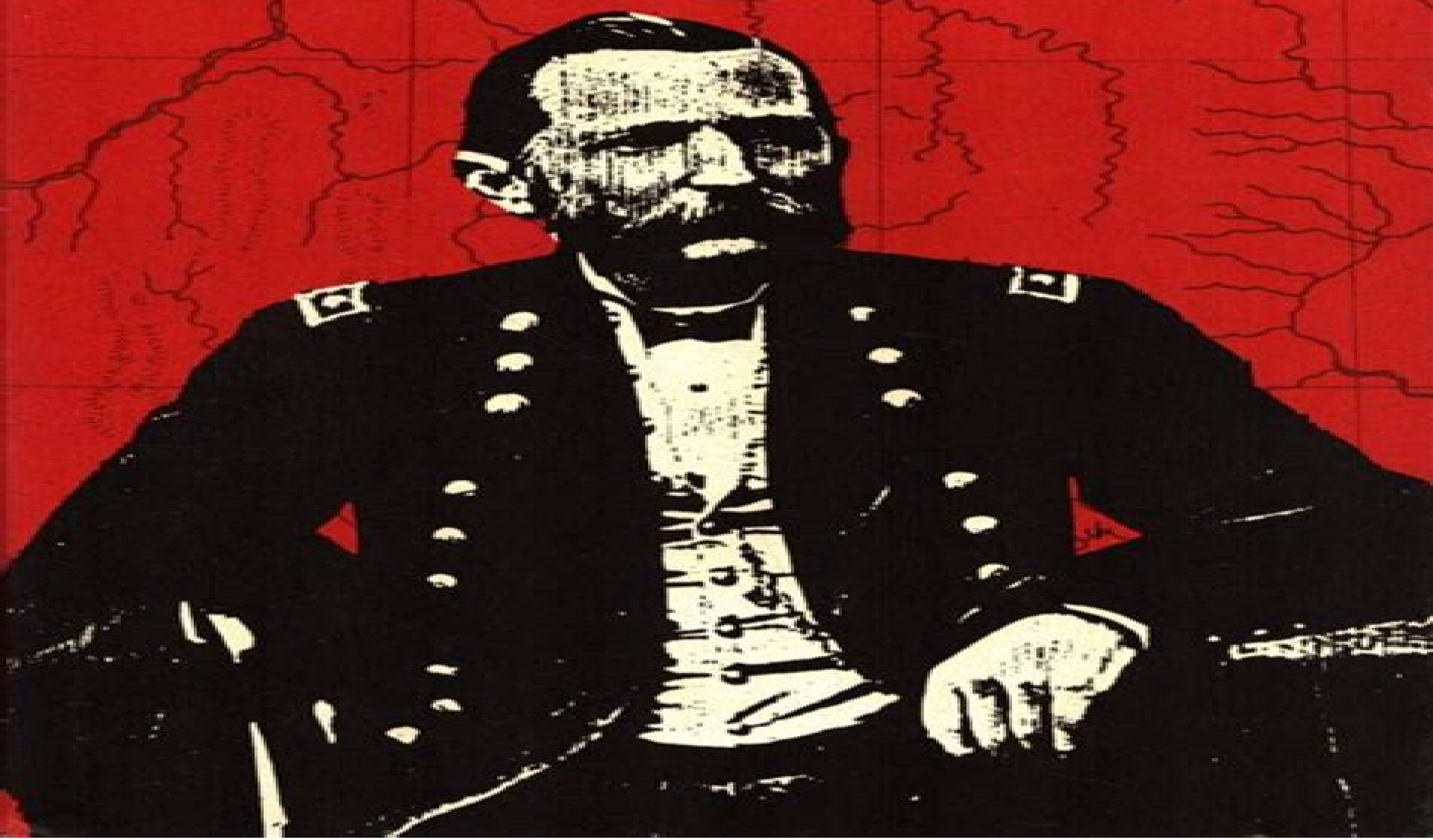

*Brigham Young and the Expansion of the Mormon Faith* Thomas G. Alexander, 2019-05-02 As president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter day Saints and Utah s first territorial governor Brigham Young 1801-77 shaped a religion a migration and the American West He led the Saints to Utah guided the establishment of 350 settlements and inspired the Mormons as they weathered unimaginable trials and hardships Although he generally succeeded some decisions especially those regarding the Mormon Reformation and the Black Hawk War were less than sound In this new biography historian Thomas G Alexander draws on a lifetime of research to provide an evenhanded view of Young and his leadership Following the murder in 1844 of church founder Joseph Smith Young bore a heavy responsibility ensuring the survival and expansion of the church and its people Alexander focuses on Young s leadership his financial dealings his relations with non Mormons his families and his own deep religious conviction *Brigham Young and the Expansion of the Mormon Faith* addresses such controversial issues as the practice of polygamy Young himself had fifty five wives relations and conflicts between Mormons and Indians and the circumstances and aftermath of the horrific events of Mountain Meadows in 1857 Although Young might have done better Alexander argues that he bore no direct responsibility for the tragedy Young relied on the counsel of his associates and at times the Mormon people pushed back to prevent him from implementing changes In some cases such as polygamy

and the doctrine of blood atonement the church leadership eventually rejected his views Yet on the whole Brigham Young emerges as a multifaceted human figure and as a prophet revered by millions of LDS members an inspired leader who successfully led his people to a distant land where their community expanded and flourished Beyond the American Pale David M. Emmons, 2012-10-11 Convention has it that Irish immigrants in the nineteenth century confined themselves mainly to industrial cities of the East and Midwest The truth is that Irish Catholics went everywhere in America and often had as much of a presence in the West as in the East In Beyond the American Pale David M Emmons examines this multifaceted experience of westering Irish and in doing so offers a fresh and discerning account of America s westward expansion Irish in the West is not a historical contradiction but it is and was a historical problem Irish Catholics were not supposed to be in the West that was where Protestant Americans went to reinvent themselves For many of the same reasons that the spread of southern slavery was thought to profane the West a Catholic presence there was thought to contradict it to contradict America s Protestant individualism and freedom The Catholic Irish were condemned as the clannish backward remnants of an old cultural world that Americans self consciously sought to leave behind The sons and daughters of Erin were not assimilated and because they were not assimilable they should be kept beyond the American pale As Emmons amply demonstrates however western reality was far more complicated Irish Catholicism may have outraged Protestant inspired American republicanism but Irish Catholics were a necessary component of America s equally Protestant inspired foray into industrial capitalism They were also necessary to the successive conquests of the frontier wherever it might be found It was the Irish who helped build the railroads dig the hard rocks man the army posts and do the other arduous dangerous and unattractive toiling required by an industrializing society With vigor and panache Emmons describes how the West was not so much won as continually contested and reshaped He probes the self fulfilling mythology of the American West along with the far different mythology of the Irish pioneers The product of three decades of research and thought Beyond the American Pale is a masterful yet accessible recasting of American history the culminating work of a singular thinker willing to take a wholly new perspective on the past **A Great Basin Mosaic** James W. Hulse, 2017-03-01 The Nevada of lesser known cities towns and outposts deserve their separate chronicles and here Hulse fills a wide gap He contributes in a text rich with memories tramping through rural Nevada as a child then as a journalist seeking news and gossip then later as an academic historian and a parent trying to share the wonders of the high desert with his family Nobody is more qualified to write about the cultural nuances of rural Nevada than Hulse who retired after 35 years as a professor of history at University of Nevada Reno Robert Laxalt wrote an article in *National Geographic* in 1974 entitled *The Other Nevada* in which he referred to the Nevada that has been eclipsed by the tinsel trimmings of Las Vegas the round the clock casinos the ski slopes of the Sierra It is a Nevada that few tourists see With this book Hulse reflects on Laxalt s insights and shows changes often slow moving and incremental that have occurred since then Much of the terrain of rural Nevada has not changed at all while others have

adapted to technological revolutions of recent times Hulse states that there is no single other Nevada but several subcultures with distinct features He offers a tour of sorts to what John Muir called the bewildering abundance of the Nevada landscape

**War Party in Blue** Mark van de Logt,2012-11-08 Between 1864 and 1877 during the height of the Plains Indian wars Pawnee Indian scouts rendered invaluable service to the United States Army They led missions deep into contested territory tracked resisting bands spearheaded attacks against enemy camps and on more than one occasion saved American troops from disaster on the field of battle In War Party in Blue Mark van de Logt tells the story of the Pawnee scouts from their perspective detailing the battles in which they served and recounting hitherto neglected episodes Employing military records archival sources and contemporary interviews with current Pawnee tribal members some of them descendants of the scouts Van de Logt presents the Pawnee scouts as central players in some of the army s most notable campaigns He argues that military service allowed the Pawnees to fight their tribal enemies with weapons furnished by the United States as well as to resist pressures from the federal government to assimilate them into white society According to the author it was the tribe s martial traditions deeply embedded in their culture that made them successful and allowed them to retain these time honored traditions The Pawnee style of warfare based on stealth and surprise was so effective that the scouts commanding officers did little to discourage their methods Although the scouts proudly wore the blue uniform of the U S Cavalry they never ceased to be Pawnees The Pawnee Battalion was truly a war party in blue

*Rescuing Beefsteak: The Story of a Pragmatic Pioneer Idealist* Myron Crandall Harrison,2018-03-08 Fourteen year old George Harrison emigrated from England to Utah in 1856 He was part of a Mormon family relocating to Zion for both religious and economic reasons The young man suffering from malaria and

extreme food shortages in the Martin Handcart Company abandoned his family and spent a winter with a compassionate Indian family that saved him from starvation Soon after at Fort Laramie Harrison served as a civilian cook for an army surgeon He accompanied troops during the march into Salt Lake City in 1858 and cooked at Camp Floyd Upon the camp's closure in 1861 he cooked at an Overland Stage and Pony Express station George Harrison subsequently worked as a freighter and served in the Black Hawk War In mid life he built a small restaurant and hotel in Springville Utah Harrison's cooking singing and story telling attracted drummers traveling salesmen who gave the restaurateur the name of Beefsteak because of the quality of his steaks
