legacy of women s contributions to Irish theatre is traditionally viewed through a male dominated literary canon and mythmaking thus arguably silencing their work In this timely book Shonagh Hill proposes a feminist genealogy which brings new perspectives to women s mythmaking across the twentieth and twenty first centuries The performances considered include the tableaux vivants performed by the Inghinidhe na h ireann *Daughters of Ireland* plays written by Alice Milligan Maud Gonne Lady Augusta Gregory Eva Gore Booth Mary Devenport O Neill Mary Elizabeth Burke Kennedy Paula Meehan Edna O Brien and Marina Carr as well as plays translated adapted and performed by Olwen Fou r The theatrical work discussed resists the occlusion of women s cultural engagement that results from confinement to idealised myths of

femininity This is realised through embodied mythmaking a process which exposes how bodies bear the consequences of these myths while refusing to accept the female body as passive bearer of inscription through the assertion of a creative female corporeality

Marina Carr and Greek Tragedy Salomé Paul, 2024-03-26 Marina Carr and Greek Tragedy examines the feminist transposition of Greek tragedy in the theatre of the contemporary Irish dramatist Marina Carr Through a comparison of the plays based on classical drama with their ancient models it investigates Carr s transformation not only of the narrative but also of the form of Greek tragedy As a religious and political institution of the 5th century Athenian democracy tragedy endorsed the sexist oppression of women Indeed the construction of female characters in Greek tragedy was entirely disconnected from the experience of womanhood lived by real women in order to embody the patriarchal values of Athenian democracy Whether praised for their passivity or demonized for showing unnatural agency and subjectivity women in Greek tragedy were conceived to re assert the supremacy of men Carr s theatre stands in stark opposition to such a purpose Focusing on women s struggle to achieve agency and subjectivity in a male dominated world her plays show the diversity of experiencing womanhood and sexist oppression in the Republic of Ireland and the Western societies more generally Yet Carr s enduring conversation with the classics in her theatre demonstrates the feminist willingness to alter the founding myths of Western civilisation to advocate for gender equality

mythology is a rich and intricate diverse world a captivating realm where deities and humans interact amidst mystical environments and celestial conflicts Rooted predominantly in the ancient cultures of Ireland and Wales this mythology serves as a compendium of stories a cultural and spiritual mirror reflecting the Celtic people s values traditions and laws By delving into the extensive range of Celtic myths particularly the mythological Ulster and Fenian cycles in Ireland and the Mabinogion in Wales we can uncover the profound influence these myths have had on European literary and cultural development The primary method of transmitting these stories was oral posing a significant challenge to studying Celtic myths The religious perspectives of the scribes particularly Christian monks have left a significant imprint on these texts but they remain crucial for our understanding Irish literature draws from significant sources such as The Book of Invasions and The Book of Leinster while Welsh literature relies on an important source known as Mabinogion Roman historians provide additional external narratives that contribute to understanding the Celts in a wider context of ancient European history Unravelling these sources requires a nuanced approach to differentiate the authentic pagan elements from the Christian additions The Celtic pantheon features diverse deities who govern various aspects of existence and the natural realm In Irish mythology the Dagda embodies paternal dominion and jurisdiction over the cycles of life and death whereas Morrigan signifies the supremacy and inevitability of warfare According to Welsh mythology Arawn is the sovereign of the Otherworld and Bran the Blessed is a colossal king with deep ties to the land and its well being The Celts gods frequently engage with humans often directly intervening in their destinies highlighting the Celts perception of the cosmos as a profoundly interconnected domain The Mythological Cycle in Ireland narrates the tales of ancient deities and their conflicts including the Tuatha D Danann celestial beings who eventually assimilate into Irish civilisation as the forefathers of the contemporary Irish people after being conquered by the Milesians The purpose of this cycle is twofold to document Ireland s legendary history and to assert a divine entitlement to the land and its governance

Clare and the Great War Joe Power,2015-07-06 Aristocrats and itinerants unionists and nationalists Catholics and Protestants the Great War united thousands of Clare men and women to a cause for which many of them would go out to fight and die Their motives varied from a sense of duty to king and country to concern about the fate of poor Catholic Belgium from mercenary motives fuelled by poverty to the moral duty to fight for civilization against the savage Huns Some followed Redmond s call to secure Home Rule while others enlisted for sheer adventure The work attempts for the first time to understand what really happened in County Clare during the Great War how its economic and political life was radically transformed during this terrible conflict and how the contribution of those who gave their lives was largely written out of history
