in Grammar and Cognition Barbara Unterbeck, Matti Rissanen, Terttu Nevalainen, Mirja Saari, 2011 Gender Across Languages Marlis Hellinger, Hadumod Bussmann, 2001-01-01 This is the first of a three volume comprehensive reference work on Gender across Languages which provides systematic descriptions of various categories of gender grammatical lexical referential social in 30 languages of diverse genetic typological and socio cultural backgrounds. Among the issues discussed for each language are the following: What are the structural properties of the language that have an impact on the relations between language and gender? What are the consequences for areas such as agreement pronominalisation and word formation? How is specification of and abstraction from referential gender achieved in a language? Is empirical evidence available for the assumption that masculine male expressions are interpreted as generics? Can tendencies of variation and change be observed and have alternatives been proposed for a more equal linguistic treatment of women and men? This volume and its follow up volumes will provide the much needed basis for explicitly comparative analyses of gender across languages. linguistic complexity II Francesca Di Garbo, Bruno Olsson, Bernhard Wälchli, 2019 The many facets of grammatical gender remain one of the most fruitful areas of linguistic research and pose fascinating questions about the origins and development of complexity in language. The present work is a two volume collection of 13 chapters on the topic of grammatical gender seen through the prism of linguistic complexity. The contributions discuss what counts as complex and or simple in grammatical gender systems, whether the distribution of gender systems across the world's languages relates to the language ecology and social history of speech communities. Contributors demonstrate how the complexity of gender systems can be studied synchronically both in individual languages and over large cross linguistic samples and diachronically by

exploring how gender systems change over time Volume two consists of three chapters providing diachronic and typological case studies followed by a final chapter discussing old and new theoretical and empirical challenges in the study of the dynamics of gender complexity This volume is preceded by volume one which in addition to three chapters on the theoretical foundations of gender complexity contains six chapters on grammatical gender and complexity in individual languages and language families of Africa New Guinea and South Asia

The Morphosyntax of Gender Ruth Kramer, 2015-08-21 This book presents a new cross linguistic analysis of gender and its effects on morphosyntax It addresses questions including the syntactic location of gender features the role of natural gender and the relationship between syntactic gender features and the morphological realization of gender Ruth Kramer argues that gender features are syntactically located on the n head little n which serves to nominalize category neutral roots Those gender features are either interpretable as in the case of natural gender or uninterpretable like the gender of an inanimate noun in Spanish Adopting Distributed Morphology the book lays out how the gender features on n map onto the gender features relevant for morphological exponence The analysis is supported by an in depth case study of Amharic which poses challenges for previous gender analyses and provides clear support for gender on n The proposals generate a typology of two and three gender systems with the various types illustrated using data from a genetically diverse set of languages Finally further evidence for gender being on n is provided from case studies of Somali and Romanian as well as from the relationship between gender and other linguistic phenomena including derived nouns and declension class Overall the book provides one of the first large scale cross linguistically oriented theoretical approaches to the morphosyntax of gender

The Syntactic Variation of Spanish Dialects Angel J. Gallego, 2019-08-28 This book offers a comprehensive overview of the syntactic variation of the dialects of Spanish More precisely it covers Spanish theoretical syntax that takes as its data source non standard grammatical phenomena Approaching the syntactic variation of Spanish dialects opens a door not only to the intricacies of the language but also to a set of challenges of linguistic theory itself including language variation language contact bilingualism and diglossia The volume is divided into two main sections the first focusing on Iberian Spanish and the second on Latin American Spanish Chapters cover a wide range of syntactic constructions and phenomena such as clitics agreement subordination differential object marking expletives predication doubling word order and subjects This volume constitutes a milestone in the study of syntactic variation setting the stage for future work not only in vernacular Spanish but all languages

While much of the literature has focused on explaining diachronic variation and change the fact that sometimes change does not seem to happen has received much less attention The current volume unites ten contributions that look for the determinants of diachronic stability mainly in the areas of morphology and morpho syntax The relevant question is approached from different angles both empirical and theoretical Empirically the contributions deal with the absence of change where one may expect it uncover underlying stability where traditionally diachronic change was postulated and inversely superficial stability that disguises underlying change Determining factors ranging from internal causes to language contact are explored Theoretically the questions of whether stable variation is possible and how it can be modeled are addressed The volume will be of interest to linguists working on the causes of language change and to scholars working on the history of Germanic Romance and Sinitic languages The Growth and Maintenance of Linguistic Complexity Östen

Dahl, 2004 This book studies linguistic complexity and the processes by which it arises and is maintained focusing not so much on what one can say in a language as how it is said Complexity is not seen as synonymous with difficulty but as an objective property of a system a measure of the amount of information needed to describe or reconstruct it Grammatical complexity is the result of historical processes often subsumed under the rubric of grammaticalization and involves what can be called mature linguistic phenomena that is features that take time to develop The nature and characteristics of such processes are discussed in detail as well as the external and internal factors that favor or disfavor stability and change in language Classification from Antiquity to Modern Times Tanja Pommerening, Walter Bisang, 2017-09-11 The volume

McGregor, Søren Wichmann, 2018-05-14 Classification is a popular topic in typological descriptive and theoretical linguistics This volume is the first to deal specifically with the diachrony of linguistic systems of classification It comprises original papers that examine the ways in which linguistic classification systems arise change and dissipate in both natural circumstances and in circumstances of attrition The role of diffusion in such processes is explored as well as the question of what can be diffused The volume is not restricted to nominal systems of classification but also includes papers dealing with the less well known phenomenon of verbal classification Languages from a wide spread of world regions are examined including Africa Amazonia Australia Eurasia Oceania and Mesoamerica The volume will be of interest to linguistic typologists descriptive linguists historical linguists and grammaticalization theorists

Aikhenvald, 2000-03-30 Almost all languages have some grammatical means for the linguistic categorization of nouns Well known systems such as the lexical numeral classifiers of South East Asia on the one hand and the highly grammaticalized gender agreement classes of Indo European languages on the other are the extremes of a continuum They can have a similar semantic basis and one can develop from the other Classifiers come in different morphological forms they can be free nouns clitics or affixes Some languages combine several varieties of classifiers Different types of classifiers show varying correlations with other grammatical categories In addition they differ in their semantics in the way they develop and in the way they become obsolescent and disappear These parameters are the basis for the typology of classifiers presented here This book is almost certainly the most substantial cross linguistic account of classifiers ever published Its range of exemplification includes major and minor languages from every continent several from the author's own fieldwork The work combines original research with innovative analysis and will interest typologists those working in the field of morphosyntactic variation and lexical semantics and exponents of formal theories who wish to explain the range of linguistic diversity found in natural language

Fróðskaparrit 55, *Studies in Language Variation and Change 2* Catherine Delesse, Elise Louviot, 2018-06-11 This collection of eleven essays traces the complex paths of change taken by the English language in its long history from its Indo European origins to the present day Just like any other language English is a complex system made up of several interconnected sub systems lexical syntactical phonological morphological and all of those sub systems are subject to change resulting in constant shifts and readjustments Additionally more than some other languages English has a history marked by strong upheavals particularly with the influence of Scandinavian and Romance languages in the Middle Ages The contributions here consider all aspects of that complex history with four of them taking a particular interest in the issues brought about by language contact with French and Latin

Contact Morphology in Modern Greek Dialects Angela Ralli, 2016-02-22 This volume bridges contemporary morphological theory with the less studied aspects of language interference and contact induced variation and change and

will serve to increase the reader's understanding of how languages of divergent typologies can affect each other. On the one hand it shows that the study of dialects offers new challenges to contact morphology and on the other it argues that morphological theory may provide accurate and interesting tools for the analysis of dialectal data. In addition it proves that dialectal contact morphology can be profitable for historical linguistics and typology since it may shed light on language change and structures. The book brings together researchers working on morphology, language contact and Modern Greek dialects, namely those that have been heavily affected by typologically divergent and sometimes genetically different languages, that is by the Indo-European and semi-fusional Romance languages and by the Altaic and agglutinative Turkish. Emphasis is placed on a number of issues which are of major importance to contact morphology, such as the role and interplay of language internal and language external factors in linguistic change, the borrowing of word structure and functional categories, the source and use of integrating elements, reduplication, multiple exponence and case and gender assignment.

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
