

Anne Spencer between Worlds Noelle Morrissette, 2023-02-15 Anne Spencer between Worlds provides an indispensable reassessment of a critically neglected figure Looking beyond the poetry she published during the Harlem Renaissance Noelle Morrissette provides a new critical lens for interpreting Spencer's expansive life and imagination through her archives giving particular focus to her manuscripts authored from 1940 to 1975 Through its attentiveness to Spencer's published and unpublished work her work as a librarian and an activist and the political dimensions of her writing Anne Spencer between Worlds transforms our understanding of Spencer It offers a sustained examination of poetry and ecology and the relationships among race gender and archives through its analysis of the manuscripts that Spencer produced and revised throughout her life Morrissette argues that the expansiveness depth and range of Spencer's writing has not been appreciated because she did not publish this incomplete ongoing work She also demonstrates that careful reading of the manuscripts challenges many of the assumptions that have governed Spencer's reception In Anne Spencer between Worlds Spencer emerges as a deeply engaged political poet who used the creative possibilities of the unpublished manuscript to explore pressing political and cultural concerns and to develop experimental cultural forms In her unpublished manuscripts Spencer pushed beyond the lyric mode to develop experimental forms that were alert to the expressive possibilities of the epic prose correspondence and mixed genres Indeed Spencer's manuscripts

serve as witnesses of historical and poetic junctions for the poet and for the attentive reader of her archives

Schandelmeier III, 2006-07-30 In 1832 57 Irish Catholic workers were brought to the United States to lay one of the most difficult miles of American railway Duffy's Cut of the Pennsylvania Railroad These men were chosen because in the eyes of the railroad company that hired them they were expendable Deaths were common during the building of the railway but this stretch was worse than most When cholera swept the camp basic medical attention and community support was denied to them In the end all 57 men the entire work crew died and were buried in a mass unmarked grave Their families in Ireland were never notified about what happened to them The company did its best to cover up the incident which was certainly one of the worst labor tragedies in U S history Set against the backdrop of a rapidly industrializing America this book tells the story of these men the sacrifices they made and the mistreatment that claimed their lives The saga of Duffy's Cut focuses particularly on the Irish laborers who built the railroads Who were these men Who hired them Why did they come Perhaps most important why did they die Based on archaeological digs at the site and meticulous historical research the authors argue that the annihilation of the work crew came about because of the extreme conditions of their employment the prejudice of the surrounding community and the vigilante violence that kept them isolated In shedding light on this tragic chapter in American labor history [The Ghosts of Duffy's Cut](#) also illuminates a dark side of America's rise to greatness [To Sleep with the Angels](#) David Cowan, John Kuenster, 1996-02-01 If burying a child has a special poignancy the tragedy at a Catholic elementary school in Chicago almost forty years ago was an extraordinary moment of grief One of the deadliest fires in American history it took the lives of ninety two children and three nuns at Our Lady of the Angels School left many families physically and psychologically scarred for life and destroyed a close knit working class neighborhood This is the moving story of that fire and its consequences written by two journalists who have been obsessed with the events of that terrible day in December 1958 It is a story of ordinary people caught up in a disaster that shocked the nation In gripping detail those who were there children teachers firefighters describe the fear desperation
