Over time his scholarship moved to a focus on the broader policy domain of child and family policy and the outcomes for child well-being His work as is true for this volume progressed from a focus on poor disadvantaged and vulnerable children to a focus on all children He was convinced that children by definition are a vulnerable population group and that targeting all children employing a universal policy as a strategy would do more for poor children than a narrowly focused policy targeted on poor children alone As we first argued more than three decades ago Not for the Poor Alone Universalism and Income Testing

in Family Policy one could target the most disadvantaged within a universal framework and this would lead to more successful results than targeting only the poor
