**A Functional Discourse Grammar Theory of Grammaticalization** Riccardo Giomi, 2023-01-30 Meaning change in grammaticalization has been variously described in terms of decreasing semantic weight and increasing generality abstraction inter subjectivity or discourse orientation The author shows that all these trends are subsumed by the notion of scope increase along a precise hierarchy of semantic and pragmatic layers of grammatical organization such as endorsed by Functional Discourse Grammar The scope increase hypothesis is immune from the exceptions and veritable counterexamples to all the aforementioned generalizations and has the decisive advantage of being more objectively measurable given its direct bearing on actual linguistic structure The extremely rare exceptions to this generalization are also addressed and found to always result from a type of change independent from grammaticalization the merger of two separate speech acts

**The Diachrony of Negation** Maj-Britt Mosegaard Hansen, Jacqueline Visconti, 2014-10-15 Despite intensive research negation remains elusive Its expression across languages its underlying cognitive mechanisms its development across time and related phenomena such as negative polarity and negative concord leave many unresolved issues of both a definitional and a substantive nature Such issues are at the heart of the present volume which presents a twofold contribution The first part offers a mix of large scale typological surveys and in depth investigation of the evolution of negation in individual languages and language families that have not frequently been studied from this point of view such as Chinese Berber Quechua and Austronesian languages The second part centers on French a language whose early stages are comparatively

richly documented and which therefore provides an important test case for hypotheses about the diachrony of negative marking. Representing moreover a variety of theoretical approaches, the volume will be of interest to researchers on negation, language change and typology.

Focus and Background Marking in Mandarin Chinese Daniel Hole, 2004-08-02. This is an investigation into the grammaticalized system of focus background agreement in Mandarin Chinese. The particles *c i j i* and *ye* are in a specific use type shown to form the core of a highly systematic paradigm. This book is not just a valuable companion for anyone interested in core aspects of Mandarin Chinese grammar. It caters for the interests of theoretical linguists as well as for linguists from other fields with an interest in information structure, focus and contrastive topics and quantification. The outstanding characteristic of this book viz its effortless integration of findings from formal semantics without heavy formal load makes it rewarding reading both for linguists with a less formal background and for researchers with some knowledge of formal semantics.

**The spell-out algorithm and lexicalization patterns** Bartosz Wiland, 2019. Empirically, the book covers two areas: the morphosyntax of verbs and categories syncretic with the declarative complementizer in Slavic, together with a comparative look at the similar categories in Latvian, Baltic and Basa Bantu. In the domain of verbs, the book investigates a curious instance of analytic vs. fusional realization of grammatical categories that we find in a semelfactive/iterative alternation in Czech and Polish, where a semelfactive verb stem such as in the Czech *kop n ou t* 'give a kick' alternates with an iterative verb stem as in *kop a t* 'kick repeatedly'. The iterative *aj* stem is morphologically less complex than the semelfactive stem formed with the *n ou* sequence, which is paradoxical given an analysis of iteratives as categories whose synsem representation is more complex than semelfactives. In the domain of complementizers, the book focuses on cross-categorical paradigms that include an unexpected morphological containment in Russian, a degree of morphological complexity in Latvian and an ABA pattern of syncretic alignment in Basa, which we do not expect to find if syncretism is restricted to adjacent cells in a paradigm. Cf. Bobaljik 2012. Analytically, the book focuses on the way the syntactic representations of these categories become realized as morphemes. In the general sense, then, this contribution belongs to a growing body of work that investigates the relation between syntactic structure and morphological form, understood as the amount of morphemes and their placement, in particular the prefix vs. suffix opposition. More specifically, however, the approach to lexicalization taken up in this book is informed by the results of research on syntax in the last quarter of a century, which show that syntactic representations are maximally fine-grained, the picture sometimes described as the one feature per one syntactic head dictum. Such a scenario has led to the situation where syntactic representations can be submorphemic in the sense that a lexical item corresponds to more than one syntactic head, a strand of research that has become known as Nanosyntax.
