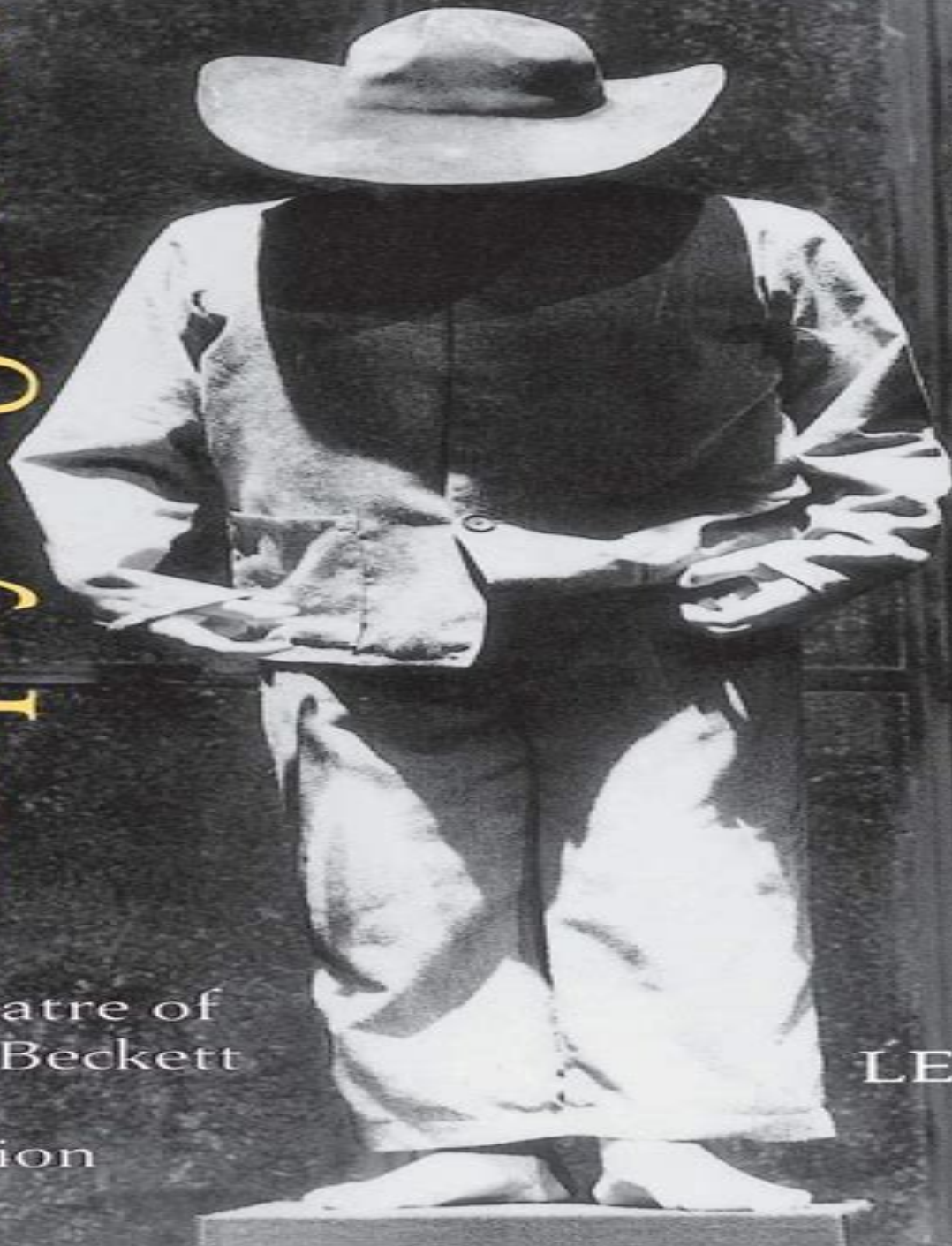

Displacing Female Bodies on the Eighteenth-Century Stage John Robbins, 2024-02-08 Displacing Female Bodies on the Eighteenth Century Stage is driven by a central question why were women playwrights in the Romantic period obsessed with silencing their female characters pushing them off the stage and announcing the removal of their own texts to the closet These playwrights were some of the most well known and commercially successful writers of their era but were paradoxically also among its most marginalized figures they were mocked by largely conservative audiences suffered intense criticism for placing their works on display before the public eye and frequently found their plays rejected by theater managers in favor of works by established male playwrights This book argues that these writers did not simply craft plays that would please the crowd but that they deftly incorporated the suppressions and subjugations to which they were subject into their works It demonstrates that within their plays gaps in discourse and representation contain a productive capacity denoting spaces of imaginative potential or drawing into focus the conditions by which such silencing and erasure takes place and argues that the long standing critical misapprehension of these works stems from precisely these strategies of resistance which of necessity took non traditional forms and thus have not been readily recognizable to audiences then or now **Beckett's Breath** Goudouna Sozita Goudouna, 2018-01-15 Examines the intersection of Samuel Beckett's thirty second playlet Breath with the visual arts Samuel Beckett one of the most prominent playwrights of the twentieth century wrote a thirty second playlet for the stage that does not include actors text characters or drama but only stage directions Breath 1969 is the focus and the only theatrical text examined in this study which demonstrates how the piece became emblematic of the interdisciplinary exchanges that occur in Beckett's later writings and of the cross fertilisation of the theatre with the visual arts The book attends to fifty breath related artworks including sculpture painting new media sound art performance art and contextualises Beckett's Breath within the intermedial and high modernist discourse thereby contributing to the expanding field of intermedial Beckett criticism Key Features Examines Beckett's ultimate venture to define the borders between a theatrical performance and purely visual representation Juxtaposes Beckett's Breath with breath related artworks by prominent visual artists who investigate the far reaching potential of the representation of respiration by challenging modernist essentialism The focus on this primary human physiological function and its relation to arts and culture is highly pertinent to studies of human performance the nature of embodiment and its relation to cultural expression Facilitates new intermedial discourses around the nature and aesthetic possibilities of breath the minimum condition of existence at the

**The Aesthetics of Failure** Marcin Tereszewski, 2014-01-03 Although Beckett scholarship has in recent decades experienced a renaissance as a result of various poststructuralist approaches that tend to emphasize destabilization and inexpressibility as the defining features of Beckett's output relatively little attention has been paid to the ethical aspects of his aesthetics of failure This book fits into that renaissance but draws on a distinct though rarely addressed connection that Samuel Beckett's work shares with that of Maurice Blanchot and Emmanuel Levinas It is within this philosophical context that the significance of Beckett's aesthetics of failure becomes most visible Beckett's work can be described as one of gradual reduction and disintegration of language a stripping away of the tools rendering expression at all possible for the sake of approaching the inexpressible Traditional representation yields to silence and linguistic aporia language yields to images of absence and emptiness The primary purpose of this study is to trace this movement of unwording and analyze the role inexpressibility plays in Beckett's prose in its visual linguistic and ethical
