*María de Zayas and Her Tales of Desire, Death and Disillusion* Margaret Rich Greer, 2022 Who doubts my reader that you will be amazed that a woman has the audacity not only to write a book but to send it for printing which is the crucible in which the purity of genius is tested A pioneer of early modern feminism Mar a de Zayas y Sotomayor wrote poetry drama and prose but is best known for two page turning collections of short stories Exemplary Tales of Love 1637 and Tales of Disillusion 1647 This book provides an engaging introduction to Zayas and her work It begins by relating what we know of her life placing her in her socio political and economic context and addressing the issue of women s literacy Following chapters examine her use of sexual desire violence and humour in her tales her narrative structures and her oral style The book then turns to identity construction in her tales and in society analysing questions of gender class family and race and to her treatment of religion magic and the
