The Ground We Share Robert Aitken, David Steindl-Rast, 1996-06-18 These dialogues between Robert Aitken Roshi one of the first American born Zen masters and Brother David Steindl Rast the Roman Catholic monk and hermit took place during a week long retreat the two old friends undertook in 1991 in a remote part of the island of Hawaii Their aim was to approach the dialogue between Buddhism and Christianity in a fresh way one that takes as its starting point a comparison of the personal experiences of the dialoguers as a Buddhist and as a Christian respectively rather than abstract concepts The result is the discovery of a surprising amount of common ground the kind of shared experience that forms a solid foundation for further dialogue
