Pretexts of Authority Kevin Dunn, 1994 Pretexts of Authority describes the Renaissance rhetoric of authorship and authority by examining the textual locus where this rhetoric appears in its most concentrated and complex form the preface In the process it shows how the notion of authorship changed in a shift of systems of authorization during the Renaissance a shift that coincides with the roots of the modern public sphere and with the change from religion to science and the public good as the intellectual court of appeal for legitimizing authorship The author focuses on prefatory materials to kinds of texts that most fully exemplify the problem of self authorization during the Renaissance First he examines Protestant prefaces notably Luther's preface to his collected works and Milton's antiprelatical tracts These works stand at the center of a rhetorical crisis having abrogated the authority of the Catholic church through an appeal to the conscience of the individual reformers found it necessary to forge a persona that could authorize their discourse without implying an authorizing will independent of God's At the same time these texts must attempt to close off means of authorization to potentially proliferating imitators The second group of prefaces the author examines is to scientific works notably those of Francis Bacon and Rene Descartes who faced problems analogous to those of the Protestant reformers in their attempts to set aside Aristotelian authority without seeming to establish a personal authority that interrupts the transparent impersonal discourse of scientific inquiry The book argues that in both sets of texts the rhetorical quandary can be resolved only through recourse to the nascent notion of common sense which allows an author to garner authority from an assumed bond with the audience Authors no longer need to posit a privileged and suspect relation with the master texts of Scripture and the Book of Nature but can instead assume the mutual intelligibility of their text This assumption is seen as the cause of the decline of the full blown prefatory practice of the Renaissance

The Voice of the Child in American Literature Mary Jane Hurst, 2014-07-15 We as adults are reflected in our children those in our literature as well as those in our families and so it is natural to want to examine their presence among us Children and child speech are important literary elements which merit careful critical analysis Surprisingly comprehensive studies of the child in American fiction have not been previously attempted and fictional child speech even that of individual characters has been almost totally ignored Nevertheless the language of fictional children warrants attention for several reasons First language and language acquisition are primary issues for children much as sexual development is primary issues for adolescents Second because vast linguistic efforts have been directed toward language acquisition research a broad base of concrete information exists with which to explore the topic And third language is a key which opens many doors An understanding of fictional children's language leads to

discoveries about various critical questions sociological and psychological as well as textual and stylistic This study examines the presentation of children and child language in American fiction by applying general linguistic principles as well as specific findings from child language acquisition research to children's speech in literary texts It clarifies sorts and assesses the representations of child speech in American fiction It tests on fictional discourse linguistic concepts heretofore applied exclusively to naturally occurring child language The aim is not to evaluate the degree of realism in writers' presentations of child language for that would be a simplistic and reductive enterprise Rather the overall object is to analyze fictional child language using linguistic methods
