theorem for sample quantiles large sample U estimation the Cram r Rao lower bound and asymptotic efficiency A separate chapter is then devoted to estimating equation methods The volume ends with a detailed development of large sample hypothesis testing based on the likelihood ratio test LRT Rao score test and the Wald test Features This volume includes treatment of linear and nonlinear regression models ANOVA models generalized linear models GLM and generalized estimating equations GEE An introduction to decision theory including risk admissibility classification Bayes and minimax decision rules is presented The importance of this sometimes overlooked topic to statistical methodology is emphasized The volume emphasizes throughout the important role that can be played by group theory and invariance in statistical inference Nonparametric rank based methods are derived by the same principles used for parametric models and are therefore presented as solutions to well defined mathematical problems rather than as robust heuristic alternatives to parametric methods Each chapter ends with a set of theoretical and applied exercises integrated with the main text Problems involving R programming are included Appendices summarize the necessary background in analysis matrix algebra and group theory
