approach is to engage the reader as quickly as possible certainly in the first paragraph frequently in the first few sentences Some aspect of a character or an episode is brought to light and the story unfolds rapidly There are third person narratives in which the author occasionally injects herself or her point of view Other narratives are presented wholly in the first person some by an omniscient narrator some by the players and from time to time Pardo Bazan has someone else tell the story to her and then as narrator she becomes the audience It is entirely plausible that some of her graphic descriptions were intended to blunt accusations of softness i e femininity that in her era would foolishly but automatically have been associated with a woman writer Still when the time came to represent the plight of women in terms of natural understandable sexual needs and intellectual acceptance Pardo Bazan captured the anguish and inferior status of her Spanish sisters
