Edmund Spenser's Irish Experience Andrew Hadfield, 1997-05-29 Spenser's Irish Experience is the first sustained critical work to argue that Edmund Spenser's perception and fragmented representation of Ireland shadows the whole narrative of his major work The Faerie Queene traditionally regarded as one of the finest achievements of the English Renaissance The poem has often been read in specifically English contexts but as Hadfield argues demands to be read in terms of England's expanding colonial hegemony within the British Isles and the ensuing fear that such national ambition would actually lead to the destruction of England's post Reformation legacy Spenser should be seen less as an English writer and more as a new English writer in Ireland his prose and poetry expressing the hopes and fears of his class Where A View of the Present State of Ireland attempts to provide a violent political solution to England's Irish problem The Faerie Queene exposes the apocalyptic fear that there may be no solution at all The book contains an analysis of Spenser's life on the Munster plantation readings of the political rhetoric and antiquarian discourse of A View of the Present State of Ireland and three chapters which argue the case that the apparently Anglocentric allegory of The Faerie Queene reveals a land gradually but clearly transformed into its Irish other Spenser emerges from this study as a writer whose experience in Ireland rendered him implacably opposed to the vacillations of his English monarch

Spenser and the Poetics of Pastoral David R. Shore, 1985-09-01 The Shepherdes Calender 1579 signalled Spenser's desire to assume the role of an English Virgil and at the same time his readiness to leave behind the pastoral world of his apprenticeship and his early persona Colin Clout Yet Spenser was twice to return to the pastoral world of Colin Clout first in Colin Clouts Come Home Againe written 1591 published 1595 and then again in the sixth and last complete book of The Faerie Queene In Spenser and the Poetics of Pastoral David Shore considers the structure of the moral eclogues of the Calender as it defines the pastoral vision that informs and unifies the entire poem He then examines the themes of poetic idealism and courtly corruption in Colin Clout and sees in their confrontation Spenser's questioning of the public foundations of the poet's heroic endeavour Finally he considers Calidore's pastoral retreat in The Faerie Queene and finds in it support for the argument that Spenser's greatest poem is essentially complete Pastoral is a highly self-conscious genre especially in Spenser's explorations of the imaginative world of Colin Clout By bringing together Spenser's three versions of that world Spenser and the Poetics of Pastoral contributes to a richer appreciation of the pastoral works themselves and to a better understanding of the shape of Spenser's literary career as a whole

The Faerie Queene: A Reader's Guide Elizabeth Heale, 1999-03-28 The Faerie

Queene is the first great epic poem in the English language. It is a long and complex allegory which presents the first time reader with many difficulties of allusion and interpretation. This book is the only convenient and up to date guide to Spenser's poem and is designed as a handbook to be consulted by students while reading the poem. Each chapter is devoted to a separate book of the poem and sub sections treat particular episodes or sequences of episodes in detail. Dr Heale considers fully the religious and political context and pays due attention to the variety of Spenser's literary techniques. Aemilia Lanyer Marshall Grossman, 2014-07-11. Aemilia Lanyer was a Londoner of Jewish Italian descent and the mistress of Queen Elizabeth's Lord Chamberlain. But in 1611 she did something extraordinary for a middle class woman of the seventeenth century: she published a volume of original poems. Using standard genres to address distinctly feminine concerns, Lanyer's work is varied, subtle, provocative and witty. Her religious poem *Salve Deus Rex Judaeorum* repeatedly projects a female subject for a female reader and casts the Passion in terms of gender conflict. Lanyer also carried this concern with gender into the very structure of the poem, whereas a work of praise usually held up the superiority of its patrons. The good women in Lanyer's poem exemplify worth; women in general. The essays in this volume establish the facts of Lanyer's life and use her poetry to interrogate that of her male contemporaries: Donne, Jonson and Shakespeare. Lanyer's
