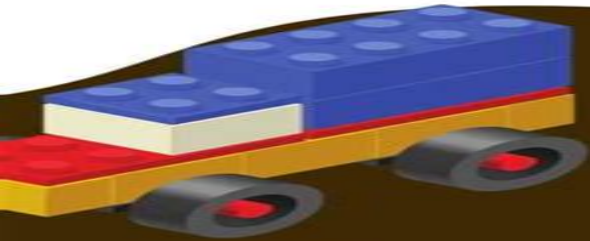


Activities for Mentally Disabled Adults
