**The Transnational in Literary Studies** Kai Wiegandt, 2020-07-06

This volume clarifies the meanings and applications of the concept of the transnational and identifies areas in which the concept can be particularly useful. The division of the volume into three parts reflects areas which seem particularly amenable to analysis through a transnational lens. The chapters in Part 1 present case studies in which the concept replaces or complements traditionally dominant concepts in literary studies. These chapters demonstrate for example why some dramatic texts and performances can better be described as transnational than as postcolonial and how the transnational underlies and complements concepts such as world literature. Part 2 assesses the advantages and limitations of writing literary history with a transnational focus. These chapters illustrate how such a perspective loosens the epistemic stranglehold of national historiographies but they also argue that the transnational and national agendas of literary historiography are frequently entangled. The chapters in Part 3 identify transnational genres such as the transnational historical novel, transnational migrant fiction, and translinguistic theatre and analyse the specific poetics and politics of these genres.

**Muhammad in the Digital Age** Ruqayya Yasmine Khan, 2015-11-15. The early twenty first century has experienced an unrivaled dissemination of information and misinformation about Islam, its prophet Muhammad and its followers, largely facilitated by the fact that the tragedy of 9/11 roughly coincided with the advent of the digital age. In the first collection of its kind, Ruqayya Khan has compiled essays that treat Muhammad and the core elements of Islam as focal points in an exploration of how the digital era, including social media and other expressions, have both had an effect on and been affected by Islam. Other essays examine how Muhammad's wives have been represented in various online sources, including a web comic, the contrasting depictions of Muhammad as both a warrior and peacemaker, and how the widespread distribution of the look of Islamic terrorists has led to attacks on Sikhs whose only point of resemblance to them may be a full beard. These findings illuminate the role of the Internet in forms of representation, advocacy, and engagement concerning Islam and Muslims in our world today.

Troutt Powell, 2012-11-14 In the late nineteenth century an active slave trade sustained social and economic networks across the Ottoman Empire and throughout Egypt Sudan the Caucasus and Western Europe Unlike the Atlantic trade slavery in this region crossed and mixed racial and ethnic lines Fair skinned Circassian men and women were as vulnerable to enslavement in the Nile Valley as were teenagers from Sudan or Ethiopia Tell This in My Memory opens up a new window in the study of slavery in the modern Middle East taking up personal narratives of slaves and slave owners to shed light on the anxieties and intimacies of personal experience The framework of racial identity constructed through these stories proves instrumental in explaining how countries later confronted or not the legacy of the slave trade Today these vocabularies of slavery live on for contemporary refugees whose forced migrations often replicate the journeys and stigmas faced by slaves in the nineteenth century

*Erna Brodber and Velma Pollard* Violet Harrington Bryan, 2021-11-15 Erna Brodber and Velma Pollard two sister writers born and raised in Jamaica re create imagined and lived homelands in their literature by commemorating the history culture and religion of the Caribbean Velma Pollard was born in St Catherine Jamaica By the time she was three her parents had moved to Woodside St Mary in northeast Jamaica where her sister Erna was born Even though they both travel widely and often the sisters both still live in Jamaica The sisters write about their homeland as a series of memories and stories in their many works of fiction nonfiction and poetry They center on their home village of Woodside in St Mary Parish Jamaica occasionally moving the settings of their fiction and poetry to other regions of Jamaica and various Caribbean islands as well as other parts of the diaspora in the United States Canada and England The role of women in the patriarchal society of Jamaica and much of the Caribbean is also

a subject of the sisters writing Growing up in what Brodber calls the kumbla the protective but restrictive environment of many women in the Anglo Caribbean is an important theme in their fiction In her fiction Pollard discusses the gender gaps in employment and the demands of marriage and the special contributions of women to family and community Many scholars have also explored the significance of spirit in Brodber s work including the topics of spirit theft spirit possession and spirits existing through time from Africa to the present Brodber s narratives also show communication between the living and the dead from Jane and Louisa 1980 to Nothing s Mat 2014 Yet few scholars have examined Brodber s work on par with her sister s writing Drawing upon interviews with the authors this is the first book to give Brodber and Pollard their due and study the sisters important contributions

*Anticolonial Form* Literary Journals at the End of Empire addresses the relationship between culture and politics in two journals published in Europe by African writers Presence Africaine launched in Paris in 1947 and Mensagem published between 1948 and 1964 in Lisbon Grounded in extensive archival work the book argues for a comparative and transnational approach to postcolonial literary studies for the significance of the literary journal as a key form in the development of African writing in French Portuguese and English and for a historically and geographically contingent understanding of the relationships between literature culture and politics This book takes up the idea of articulation to bring forward the contingent and fugitive connections that networks of literary journals fostered between francophone anglophone and lusophone writers in the conjuncture of decolonization in the 1950s and 1960s It argues that comparison as a praxis and a method was central to the anticolonial charge of those journals on whose pages we see an iterative back and forth between writing from and about different parts of the colonial world a recursive effort to establish how ideas and analyses developed in one part of the colonial world could travel and be adopted and adapted in others Many scholars have argued convincingly that the institutionalized practice of comparison in the academic field of comparative literature is itself imbricated with histories of colonialism Reza s argument takes on a particular significance in the context of that critique as the anticolonial

comparison on which she focuses offers a different tradition of relational praxis from which to think about connection and comparison itself
