Fiction's Inexhaustible Voice Stephen M. Ross, 1989 William Faulkner recognized voice as one of the most distinctive and powerful elements in fiction when he delivered his Nobel Prize acceptance speech describing the last sound at the end of the world as man's puny inexhaustible voice still talking As a testimonial of an artist's faith in his art the speech raised the value of voice to its highest reach for man as one of the props the pillars to help him endure and prevail In Fiction's Inexhaustible Voice Stephen Ross explores the nature of voice in William Faulkner's fiction by examining the various modes of speech and writing that his texts employ Beginning with the proposition that voice is deeply involved in the experience of reading Faulkner Ross uses theoretically grounded notions of voice to propose new ways of explaining how Faulkner's novels and stories express meaning showing how Faulkner used the affective power of voice to induce the reader to forget the silent and originless nature of written fiction Ross departs from previous Faulkner criticism by proceeding not text by text or chronologically but by construction a workable taxonomy which defines the types of voice in Faulkner's fiction phenomenal voice a depicted event or object within the represented fictional world mimetic voice the illusion that a person is speaking psychic voice one heard only in the mind and overheard only through fiction's omniscience and oratorical voice an overtly intertextual voice which derives from a discursive practice Southern oratory recognizable outside the boundaries of any Faulkner text and identifiable as part of Faulkner's biographical and regional heritage In Faulkner's own experience listening was important As he once confided to Malcolm Cowley I listen to the voices and when I put down what the voices say it's right In Fiction's Inexhaustible Voice Ross conducts a careful analysis of this fundamental source of power in Faulkner's fiction concluding that the preponderance of voice imagery represented talking verbalized thought and oratorical rhetoric and posturing makes the novels and stories fundamentally vocal They derive their energy from the play of voices on the imaginative field of written language Faulkner's Imperialism Taylor Hagood, 2008-11-15 In Faulkner's Imperialism Taylor Hagood explores two staples of Faulkner's world myth and place Using an interdisciplinary approach to examine the economic sociological and political factors in Faulkner's writing he applies postcolonial theory cultural materialism and the work of the New Southernists to analyze the ways myth and place come together to encode narratives of imperialism and anti-imperialism in the worlds in which Faulkner lived and the one that he created The resulting discussion highlights the deeply embedded imperial impulses underpinning not just Yoknapatawpha and Mississippi but the Midwest the Caribbean France and a host of often overlooked corners of the Faulknerian map Faulkner defines space in his fiction by creating places through culturally compelling narratives Although these narrative spaces often have imperial roots Hagood reveals how the oppressed can subvert these mythic places by turning the myths against their oppressors The Greco-Roman myths long recognized as part of Faulkner's fictional world for example define racially hybrid spaces ostensibly designed to articulate white patriarchal narratives of imperial control but which actually carry within their very dreams of Arcady an anti-imperial

narrative In Faulkner's Mississippi Delta which he modeled after the Nile Delta plantation owners evoke the imperial power of ancient Egypt to confirm their own cultural ascendancy even while African Americans use biblical narratives of the Israelites enslaved in Egypt to speak against the power that controls them Faulkner also used places he personally experienced such as New Orleans a city that he recognized as containing multiple layers of imperial design to dramatize the constant struggle between the oppressor and the oppressed Rather than reading the roles of myth and place according to conventional myth criticism or typical place models used by other Faulkner scholars Hagood examines the intertextuality within Faulkner's writing as well as the relationship of his writing to others work in an attempt to understand how the texts fit together and speak to one another One of the few books that examine Faulkner's work as a whole Faulkner's Imperialism moves beyond South versus North paradigms to encompass all the spaces within Faulkner's created cosmos considering their interrelationships in a precise holistic way

Faulkner himself called the best novel yet written by an American and a less biased critic has called the greatest American novel of the century joining Moby Dick and Huckleberry Finn at the pinnacle of American fiction Unflinching gaze , A critical examination of the Faulkner Morrison literary connection **Faulkner's Treatment of Women** Dr. Vibha Manoj Sharma,2017-01-01 The overview of William Faulkner's scholarship shows certain obvious limitations in concern to his treatment to his fictional female characters Critics have concentrated on the male characters the outmost The first limitation is that the critics have not paid the needed attention to his treatment of the female characters in their totality Critics have taken up Faulkner's characterization but their concentration is more on the male figures only If at all they discuss women characters they are seen as figure only If at all they discuss women characters they are seen as subordinate figures to their male counterparts The second limitation is that the bulk of Faulkner scholarship treats Faulkner's individual works in these studies also the concentration is mainly on the themes and techniques and the discussion on female characters is again scanty Quite a few studies concentrate deeply on his individual works and explain Faulkner's larger themes but they too are specifically male oriented The next limitation is that a large number of articles appearing in various decades also cover individual aspects of Faulkner's themes and characters and give only partial treatment to his women characters The fourth limitation is that even while discussing Faulkner as moralist the concentration is more on the male figure than the female figures The last limitation of Faulkner scholarship is that mostly it concentrates on his craftsmanship a large number of studies on Faulkner assess his stylistics and technique Tracing technical aspects thematic patterns and stylistic devices used by him critics establish Faulkner scholarship but are oblivious to the central thrust of women characters Thus Faulkner scholarship treats women characters either as secondary characters or at the most in relation to their male counterparts only They have been treated less as individuals than as common commodities the critics have been casual in their approach towards women characters and taken them for granted This nonchalant view may lead us to conclude that women in Faulkner are a silent sex For that a complete survey has been done as mentioned in Introduction of the study to trace scope on full length study in context to Faulkner's women characters At times the survey led to conclude that Faulkner himself is not projecting as pleasant pictures of women in his novels as he does in the case of male figures In fact Faulkner was accused of being hostile to women At times Faulkner may strike us as a misogynist These points led to give a kind of impulse to start working on the women characters in Faulkner His imaginary fictional world Yoknapatawpha explains the intertextuality so sometimes the same women character in different types of roles in his novels or shows amelioration and redemption in his other text Keeping all these points in consideration as his indispensable women characters fascinate to study in depth and I could get the form under the heading Faulkner's Treatment of Women It is a humble attempt I do not claim it to be the last word on the issue Dr Vibha Manoj sharma Literary Voice Donald Wesling,Tadeusz S?awek,1995-01-01 This response to Derrida's critique of the spoken uses dozens of examples in four languages to explore the voice that is in writing *Yoknapatawpha*
