

Joseph DeCamp (1849-1922)

Joseph DeCamp was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, a city that produced a number of leading Impressionists. Primarily a portrait and figure painter, he first studied art in his hometown, attending classes at the McMicken School of Design and the Ohio Mechanics Institute. In 1873 he went to Munich, studying at the Royal Academy and working in Rome and Venice with the Kentucky-born painter Frank Duveneck. DeCamp returned to Cincinnati around 1883 but left for the East soon after, settling in Boston in 1884.

A firm believer in academic principles of careful draftsmanship and well-crafted designs, DeCamp became an important teacher, initially at Wellesley College, and then at the Boston Museum School and the Cooper Art School. In 1903 he joined the faculty at the Massachusetts Normal Art School, where he taught painting and portraiture classes for two decades.

When he wasn't executing official portrait commissions of celebrated people from the worlds of commerce, education, and politics,

DeCamp was engaged in figure painting. In many of his portraits, he followed the example of Edward Degas, depicting women in explicit domestic surroundings, often in the nude. He captured Impressionism via the use of light, the repeated Impressionist use of color, and the use of brushstrokes, integrating the ideas of painting from the past. In 1890, DeCamp (after 43) married a woman named Catherine, Massachusetts, the granddaughter of the artist's father. They had three daughters. Although he continued to work for a number of years, DeCamp's later two were devoted to supporting their families. His last painting, *Three Daughters*, 1910, was a portrait of his three daughters. Rounded Up in Glory Michael Grauer, 2016-08-15 Frank Reaugh 1860 1945 pronounced Ray was called the Dean of Texas artists for good reason His pastels documented the wide open spaces of the West as they were vanishing in the late nineteenth century and his plein air techniques influenced generations of artists His students include a Who s Who of twentieth century Texas painters Alexandre Hogue Reveau Bassett and Lucretia Coke among others He was an advocate of painting by observation and encouraged his students to do the same by organizing legendary sketch trips to West Texas Reaugh also earned the title of Renaissance man by inventing a portable easel that allowed him to paint in high winds and developing a formula for pastels which he marketed A founder of the Dallas Art Society which became the Dallas Museum of Art Reaugh was central to Dallas and Oak Cliff artistic circles for many years until infighting and politics drove him out of fashion He died isolated and poor in 1945 The last decade has seen a resurgence of interest in Reaugh through gallery shows exhibitions and a recent documentary Despite his importance and this growing public profile however *Rounded Up in Glory* is the first full length biography Michael Grauer argues for Reaugh s importance as more than just a longhorn painter Reaugh s works and far reaching imagination earned
