Good Vibrations Mark Cunningham, 1998 From Elvis Presley's Heartbreak Hotel through Telstar Pet Sounds Sqt Pepper s Lonely Hearts Club Band The Dark Side of the Moon Bohemian Rhapsody Vienna Two Tribes Zooropa Older to Britpop albums from Oasis Kula Shaker Cast and Radiohead Good Vibrations follows the development of popular music recording from the perspective of the producers engineers and session players **The Musicology of Record Production** Simon Zagorski-Thomas, 2014-08-14 Recorded music is as different to live music as film is to theatre In this book Simon Zagorski Thomas employs current theories from psychology and sociology to examine how recorded music is made and how we listen to it Setting out a framework for the study of recorded music and record production he explains how recorded music is fundamentally different to live performance how record production influences our interpretation of musical meaning and how the various participants in the process interact with technology to produce recorded music He combines ideas from the ecological approach to perception embodied cognition and the social construction of technological systems to provide a summary of theoretical approaches that are applied to the sound of the music and the creative activity of production A wide range of examples from Zagorski Thomas s professional experience reveal these ideas in action **Production** Simon Zagorski-Thomas, Katia Isakoff, Serge Lacasse, Sophie Stévance, 2019-07-01 The playback of recordings is the primary means of experiencing music in contemporary society and in recent years classical musicologists and popular music theorists have begun to examine the ways in which the production of recordings affects not just the sound of the final product but also musical aesthetics more generally Record production can indeed be treated as part of the creative process of composition At the same time training in the use of these forms of technology has moved from an apprentice based system into university education Musical education and music research are thus intersecting to produce a new academic field the history and analysis of the production of recorded music This book is designed as a general introductory reader a text book for undergraduate degree courses studying the creative processes involved in the production of recorded music The aim is to introduce students to the variety of approaches and methodologies that are currently being employed by scholars in this field The book is divided into three sections covering historical approaches theoretical approaches and case studies and practice There are also three interludes of commentary on the academic contributions from leading record producers and other industry professionals This collection gives students and scholars a broad overview of the way in which academics from the analytical and practice based areas of the university system can be brought together with industry professionals to explore the ways in which this new academic field should progress **The Music of George Harrison** Thomas MacFarlane, 2019-04-08 George Harrison was one of the most prolific popular music composers of the late 20th century During his tenure with the Beatles he caught the wave of 1960s pop culture and began channeling its pervasive influence through his music Often described as The Invisible Singer his solo recordings reveal him to be an elusive yet essential

element in the Beatles sound The discussion of George Harrison's Beatle tracks featured in the text employs a Songscape approach that blends accessible music analysis with an exploration of the virtual space created on the sound recording This approach is then used to explore Harrison's extensive catalog of solo works which due to their varied cultural sources seem increasingly like early examples of Global Pop In that sense the music of George Harrison may ultimately be viewed as an important locus for pan cultural influence in the 20th century making this book essential reading for those interested in the history of songwriting and recording as well as the cultural study of popular music Beggars Banquet and the Rolling Stones' Rock and Roll Revolution Russell Reising, 2019-12-06 The Rolling Stones Beggars Banquet is one of the seminal albums in rock history Arguably it not only marks the advent of the mature sound of the Rolling Stones but lays out a new blueprint for an approach to blues based rock music that would endure for several decades From its title to the dark themes that pervade some of its songs Beggars Banquet reflected and helped define a moment marked by violence decay and upheaval It marked a move away from the artistic sonic flourishes of psychedelic rock towards an embrace of foundational streams of American music blues country that had always underpinned the music of the Stones but assumed new primacy in their music after 1968 This move coincided with and anticipated the roots moves that many leading popular music artists made as the 1960s turned toward a new decade but unlike many of their peers whose music grew more soft and subdued as they embraced traditional styles the music and attitude of the Stones only grew harder and more menacing and their status as representatives of the dark underside of the 60s rock counterculture assumed new solidity For the Rolling Stones the 1960s ended and the 1970s began with the release of this album in 1968 **Cybersounds** Michael D. Flory, 2017-05-30 I Hear a Symphony opens new territory in the study of Motown's legacy arguing that the music of Motown
