Shakespeare Without a Life Margreta de Grazia, 2023-03-28 A fascinating account of how Shakespeare s works were understood and valued by readers and writers from the seventeenth to the nineteenth century before Shakespeare s biography came to dominate readings of his plays and poetry For almost two centuries after his death Shakespeare had no biography The makings of one were not available No chronology had been devised by which to coordinate the events in his life with the writing of his works Nor was there an archive of primary materials on which to base a life And the only work by Shakespeare written in the first person the Sonnets had yet to be critically edited and incorporated into the canon Without a biography how could Shakespeare have been valued and understood In *Shakespeare without a Life* Margreta de Grazia looks at aspects of Shakespeare s reception between 1600 and 1800 that have been all but lost to the now still prevailing biographical impulse It recovers the anecdote as a form of literary criticism retrieves the ancient category of genre as the canon s organizing rubric demonstrates how the quest for authentic documents invalidated other forms of literary record and reveals how the desire to forge connections between Shakespeare s life and the Sonnets occluded his self presentation as the deceased I of a posthumous poet

Fuseli's Milton Gallery Luisa Cale, 2006-12-21 Fuseli's Milton Gallery challenges the antipictorial theories and canons of Romantic period culture Between 1791 and 1799 Swiss painter Henry Fuseli turned Milton's Paradise Lost into a series of 40 pictures Fuseli's project and other literary galleries developed within an expanding market for illustrated books and a culture of anthologization used to reading British and other classics in terms of the visualization of key moments in the text Thus transformed into repositories of virtual pictures literary texts became ideal sources of subjects for painters Illustrating British literature was a way of inventing a national grand style to fit the needs of a consumer society Cale calls into question the separation of reading and viewing as autonomous aesthetic practices To turn readers into spectators meant to place readers and reading within the dizzying world of associations offered by an emerging culture of exhibitions Attending to the energized reading effects developed by Fuseli's Gallery we rediscover a new side of the Romantic imagination which is not the solitary mentalist experience preferred by Wordsworth and Coleridge nor divorced from the senses let alone a refuge from the crowded public spaces of the Revolutionary period Rather Fuseli's embodied aesthetic exemplifies the associationist psychology espoused by the radical circle convening around the publisher Joseph Johnson including Joseph Priestley and Mary Wollstonecraft This book analyses exhibitions as important sites of Romantic sociability and one of many interrelated mediums for the literature debates and controversies of the Revolutionary period

Reading and Not Reading The Faerie Queene Catherine Nicholson, 2020-05-26 Despite its canonical prestige Edmund Spenser's epic six part poem The Faerie Queene 1590-96 has never been easy or altogether pleasurable to read As this book describes the poem's first known reader Spenser's friend Gabriel Harvey did so under duress and returned the manuscript with a plea that Spenser write something else instead Virginia Woolf's tongue in cheek advice to twentieth century readers eager to cultivate a taste for The Faerie Queene The first essential is of course not to read The Faerie Queene sums up a tradition of readerly resistance to the poem As a consequence of its difficulty the poem has an extraordinary capacity to induce doubt in readers about Spenser about themselves and about the enterprise of reading itself Each of the six chapters in Nicholson's book considers the poem through the lens of a different readership scholars schoolchildren compilers of commonplace books who value specific elements about the poem Queen Elizabeth the ostensible subject of the poem and readers who across the centuries ultimately failed to understand the poem Rather than tell us how to read Spenser's work Nicholson describes how these individual readers from learned scholars to precocious schoolboys jealous queens to algorithmic search engines have generated meaning and pleasure from an unusual and difficult text Throughout the author argues that that The Faerie Queene can be read not simply as literature but as literary theory a reflection on what reading does to texts readers and the worlds they live in
