and Greek culture the existence of public and private inscribed monuments was a vital element of dynastic control The unique insights offered by this thorough examination of the epigraphical landscape of Ptolemaic Egypt are invaluable to understanding the ways in which the Greek immigrant rulers and population established and reinforced their social and cultural dominance of an indigenous population which had its own long established and traditional written and iconographic mode of public and private communication
