retorical scholar in both criticism and theory Jane Blankenship was a long time leader within the National Communication Association including one of a handful of women who served as president in the 20th Century and an award winner of numerous teaching and scholarship awards Throughout her academic career Blankenship made important contributions to the understanding of language and form specific literary critics such as Kenneth Burke and Samuel Coleridge and the role of women in politics Most importantly she worked with and inspired a cadre of graduate students who continue to reflect her ideas and perspectives in their own work particularly in the area of political communication Through her writing and mentoring she impacted and changed thousands of lives Coming to Terms brings together some of the significant pieces that marked Jane Blankenship's career and also shows the process wherein one makes choices in writing and publishing that underscore the interrelationship between scholarship and teaching an important element throughout her academic life

Changing Differences Rhodri Jeffreys-Jones, 1995 There are more than fifty women in the United States Congress and nearly one fourth of foreign service posts are held by women Nevertheless the United States has yet to entrust a senior foreign policy job outside of the United Nations to a woman Beneath these statistics lurk central myths that Jeffreys Jones cogently identifies and describes the Iron Lady too masculine the lover of peace too pink the weak or the promiscuous These are to name only a few With an eye to the feminist foreign policy leaders of the future the author traces the successes and failures of collectivities such as Women Strike for Peace and individuals who were influential in international politics since World War I including Alice Paul Jane Addams Jeannette Rankin Dorothy Detzer Eleanor Roosevelt Margaret Chase Smith Helen Gahagan Douglas Bella Abzug Margaret Thatcher and many others These women often found ways to employ the myths to their own and to their country's benefit and more recently have had the freedom to defy the stereotypes altogether

Televised Presidential Debates and Public Policy Sidney Kraus, 2013-10-11 With this second edition Kraus continues his examination of formal presidential debates considering the experience of television in presidential elections reviewing what has been learned about televised debates and evaluating that knowledge in the context of the election process specifically and the political process generally He also examines the media and the role they occupy in presidential elections Because critics often refer to the Lincoln Douglas debates when reproaching presidential debates comparisons of the two are discussed throughout the book Much of the data and information for this accounting of televised presidential debates comes from the author's first hand experience as one who was involved with these debates as a participant observer on site at nearly all of the debates discussed Throughout these discussions emphasis is placed on the implications for public policy To suggest policy that will be accepted and adopted by politicians and the public is at best difficult Proposals for changes in public policy based on experience even when scientific data support those changes must be subjected to an assessment of the values and predispositions of the proponent These values and predispositions however may not necessarily inhibit the proponent's objectivity As such this review of television use in the presidential election process provides the context for

examining televised debates *Rights* Robin West, 2017-03-02 *Rights* brings together the most influential essays of the last thirty years critiquing and defending the liberal rights tradition Modern rights critics have focused on the perceived conflict between liberal rights and progressive or egalitarian political objectives the preference of liberal states for negative over positive rights and also the dangers to community of the overly atomistic conception of human nature which is arguably at the heart of the liberal rights tradition The Equality Trap , Despite the feminist revolution of the past twenty years most women in America are worse off today than at any time in the recent past Magazines and television programs profile women bank executives surgeons and corporate lawyers but the vast majority of women still work in relatively low paying jobs Women work more hours per week in the house and outside than ever before and a paying job has become a necessity for women in most households What went wrong In this provocative book Mary Ann Mason argues that the women s movement shares some of the blame for this situation In an original analysis that draws on both social and legal history she explains how the move away from women s rights toward equal rights has worsened the situation of American working women especially working mothers Because women are still the primary care providers for their children they must take flexible and relatively low paying jobs to be available in case of a child care problem With nearly 50 percent of all marriages now ending in divorce and with a growing trend inspired by the equal rights movement toward no fault divorce and low or no alimony settlements divorced mothers frequently find themselves economically devastated Mary Ann Mason argues that the solution to this predicament is to draw up a new women s rights agenda that will benefit all working women especially those with children The equal rights strategy was important in opening the door for the highly publicized super achievers but it is now time she says to improve the lives of the majority of America s working women This book will be of interest to readers interested in gender studies and particularly issues of equality and feminism Mary Ann Mason is a professor of law and social welfare at the University of California Berkeley In addition to her law degree Mason holds a Ph D in American social history

Carty, 2020-01-10 A careful in depth account of Ambassador Faith Whittlesey s time both in and outside of Washington a pioneer for women in politics American Swiss Foundation Ginger Rogers did everything that Fred Astaire did so the saying goes but she did it backwards and in high heels Faith Whittlesey popularized this quotation during the 1980s and many attribute the line to her In this book the life and career of Faith Whittlesey gives concrete meaning to the quotation Raised in western New York State by highly motivated Irish American parents of limited means she worked to reach an eminent position as Ronald Reagan s ambassador to Switzerland twice and to serve as the highest ranking woman on Reagan s White House staff from 1983 1985 There she occupied the West Wing office soon to be Hillary Clinton s and as a widow since 1974 with three children provided a female influence of her own to presidential culture well before it was fashionable After leaving government service Whittlesey practiced private sector diplomacy serving from 1989 as Chairman and then Emeritus of the American Swiss Foundation organizing several private high level
