Garcia,2009-03-01 Lives and Plans ,1992 *Meeting the Educational Needs of Students Displaced by Disasters* National Center for Homeless Education at SERVE.,2015 During a disaster youth may be separated from their parents or guardians Parents who have lost their homes may place youth temporarily with friends or relatives or youth may be separated from their parents during an emergency evacuation Additionally some youth could be on their own before a disaster occurs Unaccompanied youth who lack a caring adult to link them with supports and resources may have many unmet needs and not know how to seek help during a time of disaster For youth separated from their parents or guardians during a disaster school provides a stable and secure environment offering structure and supports to help them overcome the trauma they have experienced and regain their academic social and emotional footing Therefore schools and school districts known as local educational agencies LEAs and relief or service agencies in a community impacted by a disaster such as the American Red Cross or Salvation Army should work together to ensure that unaccompanied youth including those experiencing homelessness as the result of a disaster are identified linked to services and enrolled in school Unaccompanied homeless youth may not know how to access emergency services provided through agencies such as housing food medical and trauma support therefore coordination between schools and LEAs and relief or service agencies will ensure that youth on their own will find the most expedient path to help This brief will help school LEA and relief agency staff members and administrators understand the rights and services guaranteed to unaccompanied homeless youth and plan strategies to ensure that these youth are enrolled in school and provided necessary services to help them survive and recover from a disaster National Center for Homeless Education NCHE resources federal resources and other resources are included **No Place to be** Judith Berck,1992 Details the grave situation facing homeless children and their parents who live in shelters and welfare hotels **Lives Turned Upside Down** Jim Hubbard,1996 Two girls and two boys ages nine to twelve talk about their own personal experiences with homelessness and life in shelters *Meeting the Educational Needs of Students Displaced by Disasters* National Center for Homeless Education, Greensboro, NC.,2006 During the course of a natural disaster or similar emergency youth may be separated from their parents or guardians After the 2005 Gulf Coast hurricanes for example many

youth were evacuated without their parents or guardians and sent to different locations leaving the youth alone in the care of relief agencies Other youth were on their own for a variety of reasons before the storms and remained so afterwards For all of these youth school can be the most stable and secure environment offering structure and resources to help overcome the traumas they have experienced and helping to regain their academic social and emotional footing Yet without a parent or guardian to advocate for them and exercise parental rights these youth may face unique barriers to accessing education and related support services Fortunately federal education law the McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act Subtitle B Education for Homeless Children and Youth reauthorized as Title X Part C of the No Child Left Behind Act ensures educational protections for youth who are homeless and unaccompanied This document explains key aspects of the law and provides strategies for implementation The National Center for Homeless Education is supported by the U S Department of Education Student Achievement and School Accountability Programs
