Elegy Paradox:

Elegy & Paradox William David Shaw, 1994 Shaw argues that the idea of an elusive truth of an apparent contradiction that invites resolution explains the power of many elegies we read After exploring paradoxes of performative language and circular form in classical and confessional elegies respectively he examines the paradoxes of a silent speaking word in Romantic elegy and paradoxes of breakdown and breakthrough in modern elegy A contrast between strong and weak mourners in Ben Jonson's and Henry King's elegies between impact and tremor in Tennyson's elegies and between tough and tender minded mourners in Frost's *Home Burial* suggests that reading elegies like writing them is more than an academic exercise it is also a life and death issue

The Daughter's Way Tanis MacDonald, 2012-09-01 *The Daughter's Way* investigates negotiations of female subjectivity in twentieth century Canadian women's elegies with a special emphasis on the father's death as a literary and political watershed The book examines the work of Dorothy Livesay P K Page Jay Macpherson Margaret Atwood Kristjana Gunnars Lola Lemire Tostevin Anne Carson and Erin Mour as elegiac daughteronomies literary artifacts of mourning that grow from the poet's investigation into the function and limitations of elegiac convention Some poets treat the father as a metaphor for socio political power while others explore more personal iterations of loss but all the poets in *The Daughter's Way* seek to redefine daughterly duty in a contemporary context by challenging elegiac tradition through questions of genre and gender Beginning with psychoanalytical theories of filiation inheritance and mourning as they are complicated by feminist challenges to theories of kinship and citizenship *The Daughter's Way* debates the efficacy of the literary work of mourning in twentieth century Canadian poetry By investigating the way a daughter's filial piety performs and sometimes reconfigures such work and situating melancholia as a creative force in women's elegies the book considers how elegies inquire into the rhetoric of mourning as it is complicated by father daughter kinship

Gallus Reborn Paul White, 2019-05-08 *Gallus Reborn* is the first comprehensive study of the publication history and reception of the works that have been attributed to Gaius Cornelius Gallus first canonical Roman elegist friend of Virgil and missing link in Roman literary history Gallus was a widely read and frequently imitated author from the Renaissance onwards when he overcame the disadvantage of having no surviving works by putting his name to a substantial body of pseudepigrapha misattributed faked or forged poems This monograph asks what Gallus was like during that phase of his existence how was he read and by whom and what impact did he have on literary history Combining close readings of the texts with a comparative overview of their wider reception *Gallus Reborn* will interest scholars and advanced students of classical reception Neo Latin comparative literature and early modern studies

John Donne John Donne, 2000 This authoritative edition was formerly published in the acclaimed Oxford Authors series under the general editorship of Frank Kermode It brings together a unique combination of Donne's poetry and prose all the major poems complemented by rarely published letters and extracts from Donne's sermons to give the essence of his work and thinking John Donne 1572 1631 is

today celebrated as one of the greatest of the metaphysical poets whose verse was daringly original and whose use of imagery and conceits marked a new intellectual approach to poetry His Satires Elegies and Songs and Sonnets which contain his most famous love poems were complemented by his religious writing both verse and prose He was one of the most renowned preachers of his day and this volume does equal justice to the full range of his work In addition to nearly all his English poetry this volume includes over 130 extracts from Donne s sermons aswell as the full text of his last sermon Death s Duel A distinguishing feature of the selection is that the works are arranged in the chronological order of their composition

Radical Elegies Eleanor Perry,2022-04-21 Scholarship has traditionally characterized elegy as a Eurocentric tradition a genealogy spanning from ancient Greek pastoral poems via the English elegy to English and Anglo American Modernist contemporary poets Perry examines how these genealogical constructions operate as a means of framing which guides interpretation This book argues that they reflect a necropoetics a system of principles precepts and techniques which serve to establish and maintain ideas about whose lives are worthy of being mourned publicly and whose losses matter Examining elegies that challenge questions of whose deaths may be grieved elegies which articulate the various ways in which certain lives are made precarious and disposable and elegies which interrogate colonial violence structures of white power militarized forms of policing prison industrial and military industrial complexes Perry explores possibilities for radical new ways of understanding elegy beyond established genealogical frames This study retheorizes some basic terms of analysis of contemporary US poetry and poetics critical race and ethnic studies racial capitalism and contemporary theories of comparative and relational racialization

Wallace Stevens And The Apocalyptic Mode Malcolm Woodland,2009-11 Wallace Stevens and the Apocalyptic Mode focuses on Stevens s doubled stance toward the apocalyptic past his simultaneous use of and resistance to apocalyptic language two contradictory forces that have generated two dominant and incompatible interpretations of his work The book explores the often paradoxical roles of apocalyptic and antiapocalyptic rhetoric in modernist and postmodernist poetry and theory particularly as these emerge in the poetry of Stevens and Jorie Graham This study begins with an examination of the textual and generic issues surrounding apocalypse culminating in the idea of apocalyptic language as a form of discursive mastery over the mayhem of events Woodland provides an informative religious historical discussion of apocalypse and engaging with such critics as Parker Derrida and Fowler sets forth the paradoxes and complexities that eventually challenge any clear dualities between apocalyptic and antiapocalyptic thinking Woodland then examines some of Stevens s wartime essays and poems and describes Stevens s efforts to salvage a sense of self and poetic vitality in a time of war as well as his resistance to the possibility of cultural collapse Woodland discusses the major postwar poems *Credences of Summer* and *The Auroras of Autumn* in separate chapters examining the interaction of anti apocalyptic modes with respectively pastoral and elegy The final chapter offers a perspective on Stevens s place in literary history by examining the work of a contemporary poet Jorie Graham whose poetry quotes from Stevens s oeuvre and shows other marks

of his influence Woodland focuses on Graham's 1997 collection *The Errancy* and shows that her antiapocalyptic poetry involves a very different attitude toward the possibility of a radical break with a particular cultural or aesthetic stance Wallace Stevens and the Apocalyptic Mode offering a new understanding of Stevens's position in literary history will greatly interest literary scholars and students

Finally, the volume concludes with Criticism and Reflection, a revaluation of earlier scholarship on Anglo-Jewish literature, the establishment of Harold Fisch's covenantal hermeneutics as a model for reading Keats, and an analysis of Lionel Trilling, M. H. Abrams, Harold Bloom, and Geoffrey Hartman in terms of their Jewish origins, suggesting the further implications for Romanticism as a field.

Material Cultures in Canada Thomas Allen, Jennifer Blair, 2015-06-08. *Material Cultures in Canada* presents the vibrant and diverse field of material culture studies in Canadian literary, artistic, and political contexts today. The first of its kind, this collection features sixteen essays by leading scholars in Canada, each of whom examines a different object of study, including the beaver, geraniums, comics, water, a musical playlist, and the human body. The book's three sections focus in turn on objects that are persistently material, on things whose materiality blends into the immaterial, and on the materials of spaces. Contributors highlight some of the most exciting new developments in the field, such as the emergence of new materialism, affect theory, globalization studies, and environmental criticism. Although the book has a Canadian centre, the majority of its contributors consider objects that cross borders or otherwise resist national affiliation. Berryman's Henry Samuel Fisher Dodson, 2006. *Berryman's Henry: Living at the Intersection of Need and Art* offers scholars and students the first thorough and well-researched vehicle into John Berryman's epic poem *The Dream Songs*. Through a close reading of the text, an examination of the history of its criticism, and some of Berryman's letters, notes, and pertinent manuscripts, Sam Dodson offers the reader a solid starting point to appreciate the presiding structure and thematic focus of this American classic. This structure, resulting from the poet's crafting and the poem's internal growth, is illustrated in the text by more than thirty reproductions of some of the *Dream Song* drafts in progress. No existing critical work examines anywhere near the number of individual *Dream Songs* as this reader's guide, which will enable students and teachers to enter Berryman's difficult poem with confidence and a proper sense of direction. A close look at the poem's language and stylistic innovations, epic qualities, and author's poetics, and most especially the elegiac movement of the poem, will allow even the novice reader to enter Henry's world. The elegies, as a whole, provide the note of mourning that is at the core of Berryman's epic.

W.S. Graham Ralph Pite, Hester Jones, 2004-01-01. *Graham's work* was published by T. S. Eliot in the 1940s and 50s, but as a major post-war poet, his work has received astonishingly little critical

attention given its prestige and influence This collection of essays covers all aspects of Graham s work its critical reception recent influence and its relations with other developments in the arts in particular the work of the St Ives School of visual artists It includes some biographical material brief reminiscences by and interviews with those who knew him and discussions of the material contained in several collections of manuscripts Nothing so far published has paid attention to these manuscript collections or to the large number of uncollected poems published since his death Neither has enough been written about Graham s importance to poets of the 1980s and 1990s The ten essays in this book are all extremely competent studies of Graham s work constantly aware of the subtleties of Graham s very individual attitudes to his art The book will make an excellent companion for many readers and students PNReview
