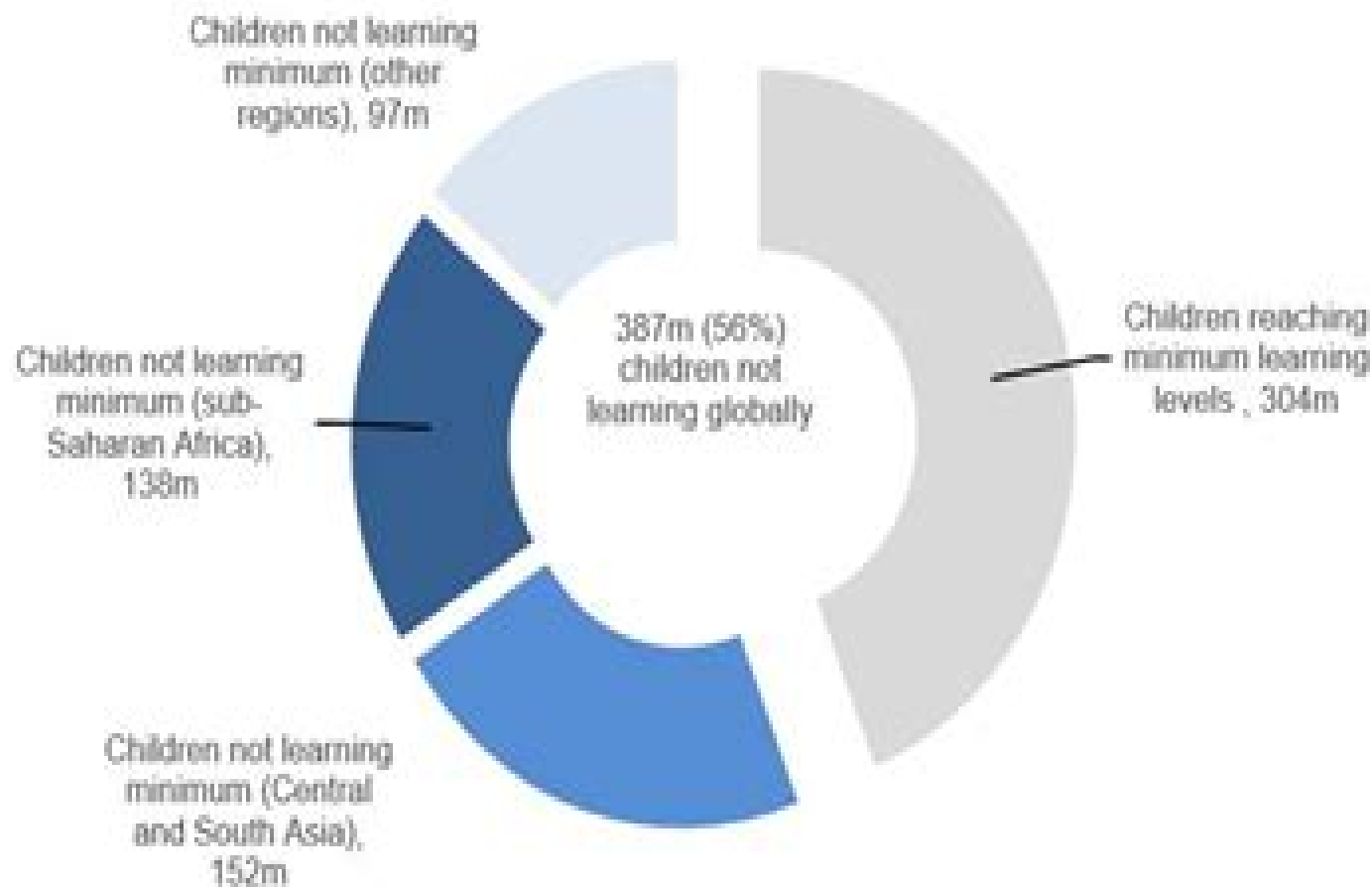

Klok, 2003-12-31 It has taken a long time to make this book Many initial drafts of the chapters published in this book were presented in November 2000 during a two day conference on Interactive governance towards a post parliamentary democracy held in Enschede The Netherlands The Netherlands Institute of Governance NIG sponsored the conference After this conference the organisers discussed the possibility of making a book on the basis of papers presented at this event In the end it was agreed that such a publication would indeed be worthwhile provided the initial papers were fundamentally revised Moreover it was agreed that also supplementary chapters should be included in order to strengthen the international comparative perspective On this basis authors of the conference papers chapters and envisioned new chapters were invited to re submit drafts The completion of the book however was unexpectedly halted by the tragic sudden death of our co editor and dear friend Oscar van Heffen In his lifetime he was the driving force behind this project Without his efforts insightful comments and helpful suggestions this book in its present form would never have been published As such we dedicate this volume to his memory the completion of the book being an honorary debt to our friend and his wife Mirjan Education in Britain Ken Jones, 2016-01-27 In the decades after 1944 the four nations of Britain shared a common educational programme By 2015 this programme had fragmented the patterns of schooling and higher education in Wales Scotland Northern Ireland and England resembled each other less and less This new edition of the popular *Education in Britain* traces and explains this process of divergence as well as the arguments and conflicts that have accompanied it With a reach that extends from the primary school to the university and from culture to politics and economics Ken Jones explores the achievements and limits of post war reform and the egalitarian aspirations of the 1960s and 1970s He registers the impact of the Thatcherite revolution of the 1980s and of the New Labour governments which were its inheritors Turning to the twenty first century Jones tracks the educational consequences of devolution and austerity The result is a book which is more attentive than any other to the ever increasing diversity of education in Britain This comprehensive and accessible overview will have a wide appeal It will also be an invaluable resource on courses in educational studies teacher education and sociology Black British Intellectuals and Education Paul Warmington, 2014-02-24 Ask any moderately interested Briton to name a black intellectual and chances are the response will be an American name Malcolm X or Barack Obama Toni Morrison or Cornel West Yet
