Heidegger and a Metaphysics of Feeling Sharin N. Elkholy, 2011-10-27 The early Heidegger of *Being and Time* is generally believed to locate finitude strictly within the individual based on an understanding that this individual will have to face its death alone and in its singularity. Facing death is characterized by the mood of *Angst* (anxiety) as death is not an experience one can otherwise access outside of one's own demise. In the later Heidegger, the finitude of the individual is rooted in the finitude of the world it lives in and within which it actualizes its possibilities or *Being*. Against the standard reading that the early Heidegger places the emphasis on individual finitude, this important new book shows how the later model of the finitude of *Being* is developed in *Being and Time*. Elkholy questions the role of *Angst* in Heidegger's discussion of death and it is at the point of transition from the nothing back to the world of projects that the author locates finitude and shows that Heidegger's later thinking of the finitude of *Being* is rooted in *Being and Time*.

Heidegger's Path to Language Wanda Torres Gregory, 2016-08-19 With the recent publication of works from Heidegger's *Collected Edition*, it has become evident that language occupied a central place in his thought from early on as he claimed in his later years. Heidegger's *Path to Language* takes on the timely task of guiding us through the development of his reflections on language from his younger years as a doctoral student to the later period of being historical thinking. Wanda Torres Gregory argues that Heidegger continually pursued the question concerning the essence of language in what he later called his background discussions. She proposes that the clue lies in his often implicit use of Aristotle's definition of *logos* in terms of *apophansis* (synthesis and phone) as the guideword for his thoughts on language. Torres Gregory uncovers three different stages of this buried path of *logos* that she correlates with his key philosophical principles at each step: the ideal of a pure logic, the existential analytic in the project of fundamental ontology, and the meditations on the appropriating event. Her analysis of the constants and

changes in Heidegger's way to language via logos continues with a systematic comparison of his different answers to age old philosophical problems concerning how language relates to reality thought meaning and truth Torres Gregory concludes with a critique that unveils the later Heidegger's dogmas and inconsistencies and challenges his concept of the mysterious language of Ereignis with an alternative bio linguistic model of its appropriating force Heidegger's Path to Language contributes to the scholarship in Heidegger continental philosophy philosophy of language comparative literature German studies and linguistics It is intended primarily for specialists in those fields and will thus be of interest mainly to college professors and graduate students

Broggi, 2015-12-17 Heidegger and Gadamer are typically read by different theologians Heidegger tends to be read by philosophical theologians examining his contribution to matters of doubt existential finitude and atheism Gadamer tends to be read by those with an interest in interpreting the Bible especially by those with more confessional or epistemically optimistic sensibilities In both cases Heidegger and Gadamer have well established associations with specific theological positions Joshua Broggi challenges this arrangement by re reading the primary texts as theological resources he defends an alternative theological appropriation of their philosophical work through a close engagement with portions of their argument What emerges from Broggi's examination is an account of the unity of tradition reason and scriptural language This account goes beyond claims of their relatedness which are uncontroversial and advances the stronger argument that they name the very same thing Although initially counterintuitive the central task set by both Heidegger and Gadamer is the investigation of that one phenomenon This argument challenges the pervasive image in which Christians rely on tradition to reason about the meaning of scripture It puts into question the injunction that theologians should balance the resources of scripture tradition and reason Broggi offers an account of Christian life as more fundamental than certain entities which are distilled out of it namely scripture tradition and reason
