Hegel's Political Theology Andrew Shanks, 1991-10-25 This study attempts to grasp the continuing contemporary relevance of Hegel's political theology which the author interprets as a uniquely radical critique of every sort of religious authoritarianism By relating Milan Kundera's concept of kitsch to Hegel's thought Dr Shanks shows that Hegel's philosophy has important implications and that it is still able to serve as a resource and an inspiration in modern times an age in which kitsch is pervasive and damaging

Apocalyptic Political Theology Thomas Lynch, 2019-01-24 Hegel's philosophy of religion contains an implicit political theology When viewed in connection with his wider work on subjectivity history and politics this political theology is a resource for apocalyptic thinking In a world of climate change inequality oppressive gender roles and racism Hegel can be used to theorise the hope found in the end of that world Histories of apocalyptic thinking draw a line connecting the medieval prophet Joachim of Fiore and Marx This line passes through Hegel who transforms the relationship between philosophy and theology by philosophically employing theological concepts to critique the world Jacob Taubes provides an example of this Hegelian political theology weaving Christianity Judaism and philosophy to develop an apocalypticism that is not invested in the world Taubes awaits the end of the world knowing that apocalyptic destruction is also a form of creation Catherine Malabou discusses this relationship between destruction and creation in terms of plasticity Using plasticity to reformulate apocalypticism allows for a form of apocalyptic thinking that is immanent and materialist Together Hegel Taubes and Malabou provide the resources for thinking about why the world should end The resulting apocalyptic pessimism is not passive but requires an active refusal of the world

The bulk of the book then pursues a reading of the analogic connection between juridico-political concepts and theological metaphysical concepts, arguing that although the turn to economic theology is indeed another form of political theology, it is a deeply anti-political one which forecloses modes of resistance. In particular, it is addressed to those who study the relationship between theology and its substitutes such as hegemony and political myth and politics, power and law, legitimacy and legality in the perspective of secularization. opponents who abandoned both quests The central argument of my thesis is that Hegel finds the experience content and actualisation of the absolute in the philosophical sublation of Christian revelation In the pain of negativity the finite human spirit realises that its self righteousness othered and killed God Following an immanent critique of Hegel's theory of grace we can conceptualise the result of human spirit's transformation into absolute spirit as vulnerable and ephemeral whenever spirit cannot account for otherness absolute spirit falls from grace and reverts into objective spirit's self absorbedness Hegel however neglected a great deal of otherness that of women the poor and colonised slaves without letting the modern Protestant Germanic spirit lose its world historical primacy I propose that we can go with Hegel beyond Hegel by searching for liberating agency in those whose pain of negativity Hegel partially recognised This turn to agents of liberation allows a critical reappraisal of a Hegelian voluntarist reading of international legal positivism The state becomes the epistemologically necessary and normatively hopeful focal point only to the extent that it crystallises the identified agents historical struggles for self determination The role of positivism is to protect the spaces of the actuality of reason that are the historical results of these struggles and from which new more transformative projects can arise
