Ralph Eubanks, 2007-10-11 Like the renowned classics *Praying for Sheetrock* and *North Toward Home* *Ever Is a Long Time* captures the spirit and feel of a small Southern town divided by racism and violence in the midst of the Civil Rights era Part personal journey part social and political history this extraordinary book reveals the burden of Southern history and how that burden is carried even today in the hearts and minds of those who lived through the worst of it Author Ralph Eubanks whose father was a black county agent and whose mother was a schoolteacher grew up on an eighty acre farm on the outskirts of Mount Olive Mississippi a town of great pastoral beauty but also a place where the racial dividing lines were clear and where violence was always lingering in the background *Ever Is a Long Time* tells his story against the backdrop of an era when churches were burned Medgar Evers and Martin Luther King were murdered schools were integrated forcibly and the state of Mississippi created an agency to spy on its citizens in an effort to maintain white supremacy Through Eubanks's evocative prose we see and feel a side of Mississippi that has seldom been seen before He reveals the complexities of the racial dividing lines at the time and the price many paid for what we now take for granted With colorful stories that bring that time to life as well as interviews with those who were involved in the spying activities of the State Sovereignty Commission *Ever Is a Long Time* is a poignant picture of one man coming to terms with his southern legacy

James Meredith and the Ole Miss Riot Henry T. Gallagher, 2012-08-01 In September 1962 James Meredith became the first African American admitted

to the University of Mississippi A milestone in the civil rights movement his admission triggered a riot spurred by a mob of three thousand whites from across the South and all but officially stoked by the state s segregationist authorities Historians have called the Oxford riot nothing less than an insurrection and the worst constitutional crisis since the Civil War The escalating conflict prompted President John F Kennedy to send twenty thousand regular army troops in addition to federalized Mississippi National Guard soldiers into the civil unrest ten thousand into the town itself to quell rioters and restore law and order James Meredith and the Ole Miss Riot is the memoir of one of the participants a young army second lieutenant named Henry Gallagher born and raised in Minnesota His military police battalion from New Jersey deployed without the benefit of riot control practice or advance briefing into a deadly civil rights confrontation He was thereafter assigned as the officer in charge of Meredith s security detail at a time when he faced very real threats to his life Gallagher s first person account considers the performance of his fellow soldiers before and after the riot He writes of the behavior of the white students some of them defiant others perceiving a Communist inspired Kennedy conspiracy in Meredith s entry into Mississippi s flagship university The author depicts the student Meredith a man who at times seemed disconnected with the violent reality that swirled around him and who even aspired to be freed of his protectors so that he could just be another Ole Miss student James Meredith and the Ole Miss Riot is both an invaluable perspective on a pivotal moment in American history and an in depth look at a unique home front military action From the vantage of the fiftieth anniversary of the riot Henry T Gallagher reveals the young man he was in the midst of one of history s most profound tests a soldier from the Midwest encountering the powder keg of the Old South and its violent racial divisions

One Homogeneous People Trent A. Brown, 2010-09-30

Southerners have a reputation as storytellers as a people fond of telling about family community and the southern way of life A compelling book about some of those stories and their consequences One Homogeneous People examines the forging and the embracing of southern pan whiteness as an ideal during the volatile years surrounding the turn of the twentieth century Trent Watts argues that despite real and significant divisions within the South along lines of religion class and ethnicity white southerners especially in moments of perceived danger asserted that they were one people bound by a shared history a love of family home and community and an uncompromising belief in white supremacy Watts explores how these southerners explained their region and its people to themselves and other Americans through narratives found in a variety of forms and contexts political oratory fiction historiography journalism correspondence literary criticism and the built environment Watts examines the assertions of an ordered homogeneous white South and the threats to it in the unsettling years following the end of Reconstruction through the early 1900s In three extended essays on related themes of race and power the book demonstrates the remarkable similarity of discourses of pan whiteness across formal and generic lines In an insightful concluding essay that focuses on an important but largely unexamined institution Mississippi s Neshoba County Fair Watts shows how narratives of pan white identity initiated in the late nineteenth century have persisted to the

of the rectilinear grid or square run up against the more reparative geography of the oval in Faulkner's narratives Contributors explore how the legacies of slavery literally sound and resound across centuries of history and across multiple novels and stories in Faulkner's fictional county of Yoknapatawpha and they reveal how the author's remodeling work on his own residence brought him into an uncomfortable engagement with the spatial and architectural legacies of chattel slavery in north Mississippi Faulkner and Slavery offers a timely intervention not only in the critical study of the writer's work but in ongoing national and global conversations about the afterlives of slavery and the necessary work of antiracism

**Student Activism in 1960s America** Magnus O. Bassey, 2024-08-23 This book sheds light on the untold stories of individual student activists at Queens College New York City during the 1960s Against the backdrop of the ongoing Vietnam War and the assassination of President John F Kennedy some Americans began to lose faith in their government Based on injustices that students saw in their campuses in the country and in the world at large they began to question their political leaders Students organized their discontents over three major issues civil rights free speech and anti war sentiments Their protests involved direct actions such as sit ins marches picketing and boycotts At Queens College QC as the students moved away from the repressive McCarthy era of the 1950s they began to confront and challenge those in power at the college in the 1960s The defining characteristic of this break from the past was a student strike in 1961 in objection to the ban of controversial speakers who had been invited to campus by student clubs The student strike of 1961 gave the activists among them a direct and immediate way to fight power on campus and to fight racism and discrimination The author argues that student movements cannot be attributed to a single explanation and therefore he focuses on individual historical contexts presenting first person narratives from the actual participants and tells their stories in their own voices from their own records and from the documents they left behind The book identifies the QC student activists of the 1960s exploring how and why they became activists their activities their achievement as activists and what motivated them to think that they could make history themselves by confronting racism It provides an intimate look at the students lives and their social justice journey beginning at Queens College and as they moved into their careers

William Eggleston is an examination of the life and work of the artist widely considered to be the father of color photography. William Eggleston was born in 1939 and grew up in the Mississippi Delta town of Sumner. His innovative 1976 exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art in New York helped establish color photography as an artistic medium and has inspired photographers and artists around the world. Edited by Ann J. Abadie, the catalog contains fifty-five Eggleston photographs, thirty-six that were featured in *The Beautiful Mysterious* exhibition at the University of Mississippi Museum from September 2016 to February 2017. Eggleston's longtime friend William Ferris, a celebrated folklorist, donated all the photographs to the Museum. The photographs range from 1962 into the 1980s, representing each of Eggleston's projects during that time. Some of the photographs are inscribed with Eggleston's rare handwritten notes about location, people, dates, and projects. Eight of Eggleston's early dye transfers are in the collection. Many of these works had not been on public display before this exhibition, including black and white images that are unique copy single prints. This is a penetrating examination of the influence of the Mississippi Delta and the American South on Eggleston's work and of Eggleston's influence on photography and other creative fields.

*To Live and Dine in Dixie* Angela Jill Cooley, 2015. This book explores the changing food culture of the urban American South during the Jim Crow era by examining how race, ethnicity, class, and gender contributed to the development and maintenance of racial segregation in public eating places. Focusing primarily on the 1900s to the 1960s, Angela Jill Cooley identifies the cultural differences between activists who saw public eating places like urban lunch counters as sites of political participation and believed access to such spaces a right of citizenship, and white supremacists who interpreted desegregation as a challenge to property rights and advocated local control over racial issues. Significant legal changes occurred across this period as the federal government sided at first with the white supremacists but later supported the unprecedented progress of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which among other things required desegregation of the nation's restaurants. Because the culture of white supremacy that contributed to racial segregation in public accommodations began in the white southern home, Cooley also explores domestic eating practices in nascent southern cities and reveals how the most private of activities, cooking and dining, became a cause for public concern from the meeting rooms of local women's clubs to the halls of the U.S. Congress.

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
