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The Theatre of the Absurd Martin Esslin, 2009-04-02 In 1953 Samuel Beckett's *Waiting for Godot* premiered at a tiny avant garde theatre in Paris within five years it had been translated into more than twenty languages and seen by more than a million spectators Its startling popularity marked the emergence of a new type of theatre whose proponents Beckett Ionesco Genet Pinter and others shattered dramatic conventions and paid scant attention to psychological realism while highlighting their characters inability to understand one another In 1961 Martin Esslin gave a name to the phenomenon in his groundbreaking study of these playwrights who dramatized the absurdity at the core of the human condition Over four decades after its initial publication Esslin's landmark book has lost none of its freshness The questions these dramatists raise about the struggle for meaning in a purposeless world are still as incisive and necessary today as they were when Beckett's tramps first waited beneath a dying tree on a lonely country road for a mysterious benefactor who would never show

Authoritative engaging and eminently readable *The Theatre of the Absurd* is nothing short of a classic vital reading for anyone with an interest in the theatre

Robert Rauschenberg and Surrealism Gavin Parkinson, 2023-03-23 The art of Robert Rauschenberg 1925 2008 is usually viewed as quite distinct from Surrealism a movement which the artist himself displayed some hostility towards However Rauschenberg had a very positive reception among Surrealists particularly across the period 1959 69 In the face of Rauschenberg's avowals of his own literalism and insistence on his art as facts this book gathers generous evidence of the poetic metaphorical allusive associative and connotative dimensions of the artist's oeuvre as identified by Surrealists and thus extrapolates new readings from Rauschenberg's key works on that basis By viewing Rauschenberg's art against the expansion of the cultural influence of the United States in Europe in the period after the Second World War and the increasingly politicized activities of the Surrealists in the era of the Algerian War of Independence 1954 62 *Robert Rauschenberg and Surrealism* shows how poetic inference of the artist's work was turned towards political interpretation By analysing Rauschenberg's art in the context of Surrealism and drawing from it new interpretations and perspectives this volume simultaneously situates the Surrealist movement in 1960s American art criticism and history

Samuel Beckett's Legacies in American Fiction James Baxter, 2021-11-30 Samuel Beckett's *Legacies in American Fiction* provides an overdue investigation into Beckett's rich influences over American writing Through in depth readings of postmodern authors such as Robert Coover Donald Barthelme Thomas Pynchon Don DeLillo Paul Auster and Lydia Davis this book situates Beckett's post war writing of exhaustion and generation in relation to the emergence of an explosive American avant garde In turn this study provides a valuable insight into the practical realities of Beckett's dissemination in America following the author's long standing relationship with the

countercultural magazine Evergreen Review and its dramatic role in redrawing the possibilities of American culture in the 1960s While Beckett would be largely removed from his American context this book follows his vigorous albeit sometimes awkward reception alongside the authors and institutions central to shaping his legacies in 20th and 21st century America
