**The West and the Word** Steffen Wöll, 2020-10-12 Western expansion in North America has mainly been described as either a linear sequence energized by nineteenth century nation building processes at a moving frontier or as the practice of settler colonialism and its exploitation of resources and displacement of nonwhite peoples This book suggests that shifting the focus from this binary pattern towards spatial imaginations and spatialization processes a new theoretical framework developed at SFB 1199 provides novel insights into the placemaking dynamics of the American West It brings to light a discursive diversity that often contradicts unidirectional interpretive patterns It becomes clear that while some discourses solidified into spatial metanarratives like the character shaping clash of civilizations at the frontier or manifest destiny alternative spatial imaginations exist juxtaposed to or obfuscated by canonical interpretations Making use of a variety of sources including works of literature poetry newspapers paintings and speeches to access spatialization processes on several sociocultural scales the book presents a careful exploration of the parameters that informed the creation affirmation and subversion of spatial imagination of the American West throughout the nineteenth century from the perspective of American Studies

In order to dismantle the destructive movement that has invaded our public consciousness and threatens American democracy, we must first understand the core beliefs that drive the alt right. Through careful analysis, Stern brings awareness to the underlying concepts that guide the alt right and its overlapping forms of racism, xenophobia, and transphobia. She explains the key ideas of red pilling, strategic trolling, gender essentialism, and the alt right's ultimate fantasy: a future where minorities have been cleansed from the body politic and a white ethnostate is established in the United States. By unearthing the hidden mechanisms that power white nationalism, Stern reveals just how pervasive the far right truly is.

**Promised Lands** David M. Wrobel,2002-10-31 Whether seen as a land of opportunity or as paradise lost the American West took shape in the nation s imagination with the help of those who wrote about it but two groups who did much to shape that perception are often overlooked today Promoters trying to lure settlers and investors to the West insisted that the frontier had already been tamed that the only frontiers remaining were those of opportunity Through posters pamphlets newspaper articles and other printed pieces these boosters literally imagined places into existence by depicting backwater areas as settled culturally developed regions where newcomers would find none of the hardships associated with frontier life Quick on their heels some of the West s original settlers had begun publishing their reminiscences in books and periodicals and banding together in pioneer societies to sustain their conception of frontier heritage Their selective memory focused on the savage wilderness they had tamed exaggerating the past every bit as much as promoters exaggerated the present Although they are generally seen today as unscrupulous charlatans and tellers of tall tales David Wrobel reveals that these promoters and reminiscers were more significant than their detractors have suggested By exploring the vast literature produced by these individuals from the end of the Civil War through the 1920s he clarifies the pivotal impact of their works on our vision of both the historic and mythic West In examining their role in forging both sense of place within the West and the nation s sense of the West as a place Wrobel shows that these works were vital to the process of identity formation among westerners themselves and to the construction of a West in the national imagination Wrobel also sheds light on the often elitist sometimes racist legacies of both groups through their characterizations of Native Americans African Americans Mexican Americans and Asian Americans In the era Wrobel examines promoters painted the future of each western place as if it were already present while the old timers preserved the past as if it were still present But as he also demonstrates that West has not really changed much promoters still tout its promise while old timers still try to preserve their selective memories Even relatively recent western residents still tap into the region s mythic pioneer heritage as they form their attachments to place Promised Lands shows us that the West may well move into the twenty first century but our images of it are forever rooted in the nineteenth

**Religion and the Racist Right** Michael Barkun,2014-02-01 According to Michael Barkun many white supremacist groups of the radical right are deeply committed to the distinctive but little recognized religious position known as Christian Identity In Religion and the Racist Right 1994 Barkun provided the first sustained exploration of the ideological and organizational development of the Christian Identity movement In a new chapter written for the revised edition he traces the

role of Christian Identity figures in the dramatic events of the first half of the 1990s from the Oklahoma City bombing and the rise of the militia movement to the Freeman standoff in Montana He also explores the government's evolving response to these challenges to the legitimacy of the state Michael Barkun is professor of political science in the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University He is author of several books including *Crucible of the Millennium* *The Burned over District of New York in the 1840s*

**Cold War Fantasies** Ronnie D. Lipschutz, 2001 As memories of the Cold War recede it becomes more and more difficult to remember what it was about and why it evoked such feelings of intensity and fatalism Fortunately we have a gold mine of movies and novels to help us recall why an entire generation of Americans grew up ducking under school desks in air raid drills and stocking the family bomb shelter *Cold War Fantasies* retrieves those times based on the idea that a nation's history self concept and collective anxiety are reflected in popular culture In *Cold War Fantasies* Ronnie Lipschutz combines an historical account of foreign and domestic politics from 1945 to 1995 with summaries and analyses of thirty novels and films contemporaneously published and produced Lipschutz rejects the standard line on the Cold War and critically examines the impacts and effects of language and images on politics Viewing those films and reading those novels enables the reader to come away with a clearer sense of how people felt during the Cold War period about themselves about the enemy and about the world while living in the shadow of the atomic bomb

*Natural States* Richard W. Judd, 2010-09-30 Richard Judd and Christopher Beach define the environmental imagination as the attempt to secure a sense of freedom permanence and authenticity through communion with nature The desire for this connection is based on ideals about nature wilderness and the livable landscape that are personal variable and often contradictory Judd and Beach are interested in the public expression of these ideals in post World War II environmental politics Arguing that the best way to study the relationship between popular values and politics is through local and regional records they focus on Maine and Oregon states both rich in natural beauty and environmentalist traditions but distinct in their postwar economic growth *Natural States* reconstructs the environmental imagination from public commentary legislative records and other documents Judd and Beach trace important divisions within the environmental movement noting that they were balanced by a consistent civic minded vision of environmental goods shared by all They demonstrate how tensions from competing ideals sustained the movement contributed to its successes but also limited its achievements In the process they offer insight into the character of the broader environmental movement as it emerged from the interplay of local state and national politics The study ends in the 1970s when spectacular legislative achievements at the national level were masking a decline in mainstream civic engagement in state politics The authors note the rise of the private ecotopia and the increasing complexity in the way Americans viewed their connections with the natural world Yet today despite wide variations in beliefs and lifestyles a majority of Americans still consider themselves to be environmentalists In *Natural States* environmental politics emerges less as a conflict between people who do and do not value nature and more as a debate about the way people define

and then chose to live with nature In their attempt to place the passion for nature within a changing political and cultural context Judd and Beach shed light on the ways that ideals unify and divide the environmental movement and act as the source of its enduring popularity
